Let the Forget-Me-Not seed So the Goldfinch can feed

From our Reporter at the Parish Council Meeting

The Agenda for our PC increases month by month. This started to happen ever since the PC was told to remove 'Any Other Business' from the Agenda and to

substitute it with 'Items for the Next Agenda'. In other words no decision or action can be taken on any new matter which has arisen since the last meeting and which is not included in the agenda.

Therefore the PC will now be including almost everything in 'Items for the Next Agenda' just in case a matter of importance arises. This of course will require ruthless control by the Chairman to prevent people repeating themselves each month. But it's a worthwhile precaution because no-one has yet explained why no



action/decision can be taken on items brought up in 'Any Other Business'. This is a challenge to Mrs Hazel Williams (whose work and ability I admire greatly).

At the beginning of each meeting members declare their non-interest in any item on the Agenda. This was followed by the "Parish Council Vacancy" and the good news that someone was willing to fill it. The volunteer was David Almond, manager of Lord's Ground Farm, who was voted in unanimously, with David remarking how pleased he was to return to the village. I am particularly delighted because David used to be as fine a right wing as we have ever had and it's good to know he will be out there again in the Annual Boxing Day Hockey Match. He also has a very good knowledge of the fens and this together with his realistic approach can only be good for the PC. Steve asked whether David should declare any interests and was told that it didn't matter. This was very confusing because here was a member/stranger who could vote on any issue without the PC knowing if he had any interests in any item. Steve just hoped that nothing "illegal is happening".

Geoffrey raised again the 'Travellers in Headlake Drove' issue and even though the situation changes little it is good he does. At present it seems there is a huge row between the CCC and ECDC about the rubbish. ECDC asks CCC to remove the travellers, CCC won't or fails to, the rubbish multiplies, and ECDC picks up the bill. Neither of these councils is necessarily at fault but both are constrained by........... (fill in your own words).

In 'Correspondence Received' one letter of significance was from Dominic Doble, Senior Countryside Access Officer, to Jake Williams of the National Trust regarding the installation of cattle grids on "Reach (191) Byway 14 'Straight Drove". It is a very long letter, and I just quote for public interest the last paragraph:-

"I accept that these attempts to balance public rights with private goals may not be the responses you were hoping for, particularly in the latter case. Nevertheless, doing the right thing by local people, within the constraints of the law, should set the National Trust up favourably to pursue the laudable aims of Wicken Vision in the years ahead."

Perhaps we need a reminder about this Wicken Vision. We are threatened with Global Warming and a rising sea and to meet this challenge the National Trust

proposes to flood the fen. Is this the Vision? Why not save the money, I wonder. Meantime someone made the observation that the NT was better at looking after buildings than land.

Geoffrey again raised his "Don't Ditch the Lodes!" campaign (see his letter, page 5, of the June *Crier* which unfortunately omitted the web reference to register your objection). David thought the local people with an interest ought to be better organised because as far as he could see the reaction was rather "spasmodic" and "not terribly well organised". This may well be, as Geoffrey ought to have many more than the 200 signatories he has at that time of writing. It should be nearer 2,000? Maybe there is an emphasis on quality rather than quantity.

Next came up the possibility of Quality Status for our PC. Hazel Williams is red hot on this and she forcefully put forward the need for it in what I thought was at times a bullying approach which was almost tantamount to blackmail. Or maybe it was just excessive enthusiasm. It took Steve to ask pertinent questions whether the extra paperwork gives any tangible benefit, whether not being a Quality PC will have a serious affect, and whether you have to be a Quality PC to have a Quality Clerk – as Karen is fast becoming. A list of requirements will be sent to the PC for its consideration and it will then decide. One requirement it seems is a quarterly report – "But we do a monthly report and also have a monthly outside reporter". This won't do it seems. What we would quite like in this village is a monthly report from our ECDC and CCC representatives, though I suppose a quarterly one would do if time is short.

Mill Hill traffic continues to be of concern and the PC was meeting CCC officials on site on the following Wednesday in the search for a solution - money permitting. Meanwhile there is a very simple measure which would produce immediate results and which is employed in the top half of the High Street. Park on the road a big car which is rarely or never used. The results would be remarkable. All that's needed is a car or a large van. Does anyone have a spare one? Maybe there could be a parked car rota. Give it a try and see what happens.

Then we moved on to the High Street Signs issue which could go on and on and eventually acquire the notoriety of the Shakespeare authorship question. Geoffrey had previously said that if the signs weren't taken away he would personally remove them. He reported that Allen Alderson had advised him not to do so as he could be thrown off the PC for misconduct. Geoffrey was torn between appearing as a "man of straw" or not staying on the PC. There was no contest. Correspondence has been flying around and I think the latest is that the Chief Executive of ECDC has entered the fray and is seeking the official confirmation from the Bulbeck/Prior PCs as to their requirements.

OF COURSE IT COULD BECOME MUCH WORSE. I have a friend in the lovely Cotswold village Painswick who lives in a house which for 400 years has been known as Brook House. A recent arrival in the village did not like the name of his new house and renamed it Brook House. In spite of protests and pleas he has refused to drop the name. There is nothing that the Painswick PC can do, because the Stroud District Council and Post Office rules stipulate that while there is no limit to the number of similar names in a town or village, they only draw the line at more than one house with the same name in any one street. This means that we could have a Swaffham Prior House (or Anglesey House, Shadworth House or any other house name) in Rogers Road, in Greenhead Road, in Lower End etc. Wouldn't that get our PC excited! We must hope that no-one in the village has a mischievous sense of humour.

62 Years and Counting

RON PRIME'S prowess as a film-maker was much in evidence at this year's festival, where three beautifully constructed and evocative films featuring the restoration of the village windmills, the restoration St Cyriac's bells and the events of the millennium year were greatly appreciated by a near-full-house audience, as too was



the exhibition of black-and-white photographs of historic village events.

Ron started his film career with a spell with Rediffusion (some of us will remember this!) and, as well as his professional involvement, further sharpened his skills with a London film club. For villagers who had not had the opportunity to see these films before, it was quite a shock to see themselves and their neighbours take starring roles in BBC quality documentaries; but Ron's work always is of this standard.

As the editors guzzled their pop-corn in the second row, they couldn't help but reflect on the historical importance of work such as this. Although daily inundated by media reconstruction of anything and everything, this honest record of English village life as it was *actually* lived here in the latter part of the 20th century and early 21st is nevertheless extremely rare.

However, one black-and-white photo was noticeable by

its absence: Ron and Betty Prime themselves, getting married on June 9th 1945. CONGRATULATIONS, Ron and Betty, on your *sixty-second* wedding anniversary!

It was organised by the Churches in our Benefice – The Anglesey Group – and ladies from all 5 Churches joined together and organised the event. Fiona had been booked to speak for quite a few months and we had planned this Lunch for many weeks. We were not disappointed. When the day arrived, the sun shone brilliantly, 90 ladies came into Quy Village Hall and enjoyed a meal of cold meat salad followed by delicious puddings provided generously by many willing ladies! It was wonderful to have ladies from Bottisham, Lode, Quy, Swaffham Bulbeck, Swaffham Prior, the free Church in Swaffham Bulbeck and Lode Chapel sitting down and enjoying a meal together. We even had "friends of friends" from further afield with us which was marvellous.

After eating a delicious lunch together, Fiona Castle then spoke, and her subject was "Living Simply". As many of you will know, Fiona is the widow of the late Roy Castle - musician and entertainer. She is a committed Christian and often goes to occasions such as this and speaks about her books and/or her life. On this occasion her talk was based on her latest book entitled "Living Simply". The attention of

every lady in the Hall was held as Fiona spoke most movingly on that theme. She first told us about her daughter Julia who works among the women of Peru in the shanty towns there. We learned about the simplicity of their lives, how little they possess materially, and yet how much they possess spiritually. She told us of the overwhelming welcome she received when she visited their Church with Julia. She then very cleverly took us through her book, going from room to room of a house and likening the furniture of each room to the "clutter" that can accumulate in our minds and hearts. We learned how she had "de-cluttered" her life and how we could do the same. We sat spellbound and I feel sure that nobody went out of the Hall unmoved and I'm sure we all had much to think about.

We are so deeply grateful to Fiona for coming to talk to us that afternoon. She travelled from Buckinghamshire to be with us and claimed no travelling expenses and did not want a fee for speaking. We never planned this as a fundraising event and charged $\pounds 5$ per ticket. However, the Lord blessed us, because we not only covered the cost of the food, but, along with donations given on the day, we were able to send $\pounds 374$ to charity, including "Activate", which is Fiona's own charity.

It was a day of hard work, a lot of fun, good food, and friendship. I would like to say a very big heartfelt "thank you" to all the ladies who worked so hard to help with this event -I can honestly say that it was very much appreciated by all. Everyone is now looking forward to the next "LL" !

DON'T LET SMOKE GET IN YOUR EYES or PUT OUT THAT FAG

Swaffham Prior Village Hall, following an Act of Parliament, is to become a non-smoking venue from 1st July. This Act also applies to other Village halls - and organisations such as the Church. "But surely no-one ever smokes inside a church" people say.


This is not so. Professor Elizabeth Anscombe did. She was a Professor of Philosophy at Cambridge, a literary executor, editor and translator of Wittgenstein, and was possibly the greatest English philosopher of her generation.

But what has this to do with smoking



and the Church. Well, Elizabeth Anscombe, a Roman Catholic, used to read her newspaper and smoke a cigar at the back of her church on a Sunday. Possibly only the Roman Catholic church tolerates such human foibles.

Why a cigar? She was a cigarette chain smoker. But when her second son became seriously ill she bargained with God that she would give up smoking cigarettes if he recovered. He did recover, she did give up smoking, and the strain became too much. She re-examined the bargain with God, realised she had not mentioned cigars or pipes, and took to smoking these.



Professor Anscombe was what is known as a "well -bosomed" lady, who was outspoken, was the mother of seven children, and died in 2001 at the age of 81. She was a lady who always wore trousers except when pregnant. Once, entering a smart Boston restaurant in the 1960's she was told that ladies were not admitted in trousers. So she simply took them off and went in.

How would she deal with one of the 1,200 council employees who initially are to be trained to sit amongst drinkers under cover? – funded by a £29.5 million grant to councils. Maybe a little biff on the head with an umbrella and with the appropriate comment "silly little man".

But not all is lost for smokers. Under 'Statutory Instrument 2007 No 765 The Smoke-free (Exemptions and Vehicles) Regulations 2007' you can continue to smoke





1) If you are in a submarine at sea (Difficult to go outside)

2) If you are in jail (It may make you unhappy) These may not be the most acceptable options for many but there is one further exemption which may increase the number of amateur actors and supporters of the theatre.





Sponsored Walk



Notes from the Parish Council June Meeting

Chairman Mr John Covill chaired the meeting with 7 Parish Councillors and 2 members of the Public.

Minutes of Last Meeting: These were agreed.

Parish Council Vacancy: Mr David Almond of 32 Cage Hill was co-opted onto the Parish Council.

Reports: CCC – Cllr Hazel Williams reported to the meeting

ECDC – Cllr Allen Alderson sent his apologies but was unable to attend **Correspondence Received:** This was reported.

Matters Arising:

Peter Hart asked whether any progress had been made with reference to maintenance work to the substation at the bottom of Cage Hill. The Clerk confirmed that she had not heard anything further from EDF but would follow up.

Quality Status for Parish Council: There were varying opinions on the value of attaining Quality Status and it was agreed to defer until the July meeting to allow members to consider further.

Adoption of New Code of Conduct: Copies of a "Guide for Members May 2007" had been circulated. Again, it was agreed to defer this to the July meeting to allow members to consider further.

Road Safety Measures/Traffic Calming – Mill Hill: The Clerk confirmed that a meeting with Kevin Hall, Traffic Engineer for CCC was to be held on the 20th June 2007 to discuss what measures could be put in place.

Jointly Funded Minor Highways Improvements – 2008/09 Bidding Round: To be deferred until next meeting.

Use of Footpath at The Beeches by Bikers: Several complaints had been received with reference to bikers using the footpath as a cut through from Lower End to Fairview & vice-versa causing considerable disturbance and distress to residents. It was suggested that some form of 'staggered barrier' should be installed across the top of the footpath to stop access. A meeting was arranged with Paul Butcher of CCC to discuss what could be done.

The Lodes: Geoffrey Woollard reaffirmed the importance to keep a watchful eye on proposals for The Lodes. David Almond suggested that it would be useful to have a meeting of interested Parish Councils to share views. This was felt by all to be a good idea. The Clerk is to contact Swaffham Bulbeck, Burwell Reach, Wicken and Lode Parish Councils.

High Street Signs & House Numbering: Cllr Alderson had passed to the Clerk a copy of a letter received from John Hill, Chief Executive-ECDC which asked for confirmation of which signs should be removed/remain. It was agreed that two "High Street" signs should be removed (one to the left hand side of the entrance to Swaffham Prior House and one to the right hand side of the Swaffham Prior House farm entrance on the Village boundary with Swaffham Bulbeck). It was agreed that the removal of the "Green Bank Road, Swaffham Bulbeck" sign was a matter for Swaffham Bulbeck Parish Council but that Swaffham Prior Parish Council would support any decision to remove this sign.

Play Area Maintenance Works: Confirmation of original estimates for this work was still awaited. Only one estimate had been confirmed. It was agreed to carry this over to July meeting. A verbal estimate had been received for the removal of algae on the surfacing beneath the slide. This will be considered with the foregoing at the July meeting.

Steve Kent-Phillips agreed to organise a working party to cut back the new growth at the base of the 3 trees to the front of the play area as recommended in the RoSPA annual inspection report.

Maintenance Works to Cemetery Path: It was agreed to defer this until the July meeting.

Request for Donation from Swaffham Prior Playscheme 2007: A donation of £100 was agreed.

Accounts for payment: These were agreed.

Planning Applications:

The Cottage, 67 High Street – *single storey rear extension (reduced proposal)*. No objections.

16 Green Head Road - two storey rear extension. No objections.

Do You Facebook?

I've recently been introduced to the relatively new internet phenomenon of Facebook. You register online, write a profile and then develop a virtual network of friends. These friends are people you know or have known in 'real life' who also have set up a profile at <u>www.facebook.com</u>, but can grow as other people come across your profile and ask to 'be your friend'. You can swap news, upload photos, share movie reviews and, if you happen to be online at the same time, you can even 'poke' one another! You might think that this new craze would be limited to the younger generation – but amongst the first people I was able to link up with on the site was none other than Rev. David Lewis!

The desire to 'connect' with people is as new as the twenty first century, and as old as time. Right at the beginning of the Bible we hear God telling us "it is not good to be alone" and even the most introverted of us needs to relate to others at least some of the time. It is our interaction with others which, in part, define who we are whether it is members of a family, players in a team or regulars at the social club. Psychologists will tell you that we all have a need to feel that we 'belong'.

Although some will look at the 'virtual friendships' on Facebook and make the judgement that they can never replace 'the real thing', its amazing growth in popularity is clearly an indication of something that has been missing in today's society. Many people who have lived in the village for decades will tell you how the 'sense of community' is not like it used to be - now the definition of a 'good neighbour' is someone who keeps themselves to themselves and doesn't cause us any bother. We're too busy to connect - our lives have become so full of 'doing' that we've got no time for 'being with'. Even when we're relaxing at home we tend to do so as individuals in our separate rooms or in front of the television – not really connecting at all.

I'm not sure whether we'll ever 'do community' like we used to, or whether Facebook is a suitable replacement. I do think, however, that church should try to be a place which explores what community means and seeks to model the principles it discovers. It should be a place where we can journey together, not as individual 'consumers of spirituality' but as people learning to relate to one another better as we seek also to 'connect' with the one who designed us for relationship in the first place.

PASTORAL LETTER, July 2006

Bottisham Vicarage

Dear Friends,

It is often said that a dog is a man's best friend. Our Golden Retriever Henry is a wonderful friend. He and I enjoy lovely walks together each day, and Henry is especially excited on our day off (yes, he does seem to know when it is our day off!) because of the promise of a long and interesting walk in different surroundings. I often talk to him as we walk along, and he is always a happy, cheerful companion. He loves his walks very much, and his fluffy tail is always sticking up like a sail in the breeze as he lopes along and takes in the sights and smells of the countryside. His natural enthusiasm for life always lifts my mood when we are out together, and his quiet and gentle companionship around the house is always somehow reassuring. Children naturally respond to Henry, and he very much enjoys their attention. I often take him into school as a live 'visual aid' for the message that I want to share with the children. I have always felt that it is good for children to have a dog because it encourages them to take on a tangible responsibility for a real friend, and at the same time they get real enjoyment from the love and affection that a dog can offer.

I am reminded of the lovely story I have told occasionally in sermons of the newsboy delivering the evening paper to a farmhouse. The boy noted the sign 'Puppies for Sale' and got off his bike and said to the farmer, "How much do you want for the pups, sir?" "Twenty-five pounds, son." Replied the farmer. The boy's face dropped at the size of the sum, and he pleaded. "Well, sir, could I at least see them anyway?" The farmer whistled, and in a moment the mother came bounding around the corner of the house quickly followed by four excited puppies, wagging their tails and yapping excitedly.

The boy looked at the puppies with delight and reached out to stroke and cuddle them. But then another pup came straggling around the house, dragging one hind leg awkwardly along. Immediately the boy stiffened and asked the farmer, "What's the matter with that puppy, sir?" The farmer replied, "Well, son, that puppy is crippled. We took him to the vet and the doctor took an x-ray. He doesn't have a hip joint and that leg will never be right." To the amazement of the farmer, the boy immediately reached into his pocket and took out a 50p coin. "Please, sir," the boy pleaded, "I want to buy that pup. I'll pay you 50p every week until the twenty-five pounds is paid. Honest I will, sir."

The farmer was by then really concerned and gently replied, "but, son, you don't seem to understand. That pup will never, never be able to run or jump. That pup is going to be a cripple forever. Why in the world would you want such a useless pup as that?"

The boy paused for a moment, then reached down and pulled up his trouser leg, exposing an ugly iron brace and leather knee-strap holding a poor twisted leg. The boy answered, "Sir, that pup is going to need someone who really understands him, and who really wants to help him in life!"

For me that story says so much about the way that God relates to us. There are times in all of our lives when we feel a bit like that poor crippled pup, whether it be through illness, depression, bereavement or through major problems or difficulties that have arisen in our lives. God is like that newspaper boy. He has experienced every aspect of human suffering for himself when he came into the world to live in poverty in an ordinary poor human family, through his Son Jesus Christ. And then He experienced the unspeakable suffering and death of the cross. The wonderful message of Jesus Christ is that God has been there and really understands our needs, and really wants to help us in life.

So never be afraid to reach out to God and share your problems with Him in prayer. He always understands, always cares and will always seek to enfold you in His love.
