From our Reporter at the Parish Council Meeting

Like many in the nation I was bewildered and bemused by the astonishing shenanigans over the two weeks prior to the July PC meeting. backstabbing, exposed incompetence, increased hate mail and racism, Ken Clarke's illuminating off the record exposure, Tories accused of denying democracy by avoiding the vote for the new prime minister by the 160,000 members of what some people call, not I, the "blue rinse and pearl brigade", the Labour Party fudging the rules so that what some people, not I, call the "Militant Tendency Hard Left" are able to elect the Labour leader and possible future prime minister, and the long awaited Chilcot Inquiry report which barely got a look in.

Dodgy CVs,

So it was with some relief when I set off one Thursday evening to report on the July PC meeting. Here one knows exactly where one stands. Tradition and stability is always maintained. Though no reporter was there I am sure that the new PC member, Mike Malster, was installed with all dignity and decorum. No skulduggery there. And with so many ladies now running countries it is comforting to have the assurance that our PC still appears to maintain the policy of one token lady member on the committee. Currently it is Sandra Gynn. Previous incumbents have been Elaine Malster, Pat Cunningham, and Elisabeth Everitt.

Events that evening took off with David Brown explaining the CCC's current thinking on the proposed combined authority for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, with a directly elected mayor. If this is agreed there could be a bundle of money available. It was decided to go to public consultation on the proposed deal. Alan had the ECDC statement explaining that the Government proposes putting the power and funding "into the hands of local people". [Huh – what about our Local Plan – more later]. It seems "no powers will be taken away from councils" without their consent. [Reassuring?]. If anyone has views you can give them by going onto the CCC website at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk.

There were two planning applications this month. The one for 36 Mill Hill passed without objection. But the one for 65 High Street certainly caused a stir. New building has been taken out of the "hands of local people". We once had a Local Plan that preserved the village as a conservation area and which prohibited Back Fill. This Local Plan has been suspended until 2018, and in the meantime anyone can offer up land anywhere in the village for development. Behind 65 High Street is a huge garden and the application is for one house with a road going up, between 65 and 67, to the top where there is space for another three houses at some stage.

Three people attended the meeting to lodge their protests and they were joined, fortuitously at the very moment the meeting was thrown open, by two other big hitters. One very learned member of the public stated that the development would be "a travesty". The PC will be lodging many objections, one of which is that it would destroy the conservation area and certainly impair the view of the two churches which is one of the features of the village. The PC urged everyone concerned to lodge their own individual concerns. I have a feeling that Phil Sheldrake, the original owner, will be turning in his grave. On the other hand he did have a quietly philosophical humour, and may be chuckling.

We were brought up to date with the latest CIL monies news. Some is being used to revamp the streetlights. All the works had been agreed when it was discovered that the telephone pole near the school entrance had been removed, together with the street light. On enquiring, the PC was told by BT that the light had never been authorised and should never have been put up there. The school is happy with its own lighting of the steps and the PC has saved a little money. But it is not happy with the coming and going of posts in that area, without being informed or consulted. We have now bought the phone box for £1. Steve informed us it is a special phone box with the gold crown to commemorate the silver jubilee of King George V in 1935. In it will be a defibrillator, and various neighbours will be trained to use it.

The Soil Heap in the cemetery has at last been removed. In future all gravediggers will need to remove their own spoil. There then followed a very long discussion about the use, and state, of the cemetery. I am not sure anything was ever resolved. In brief – is there a gate, a gap, a board dividing the cemetery from the allotments, is there or isn't there a fence, and does it do the job, is there any objection to walkers going through the cemetery and out through the allotments, should the cemetery be reserved as just a place of peace and reflection with casual people being urged to walk by the side of the horses field and going in by the side gate, how does one stop travellers using the water tap especially as there have been lumps of brown evidence showing that Dobbin may also have been invited in. The seemingly endless discussion continued with the question of the incinerator for dead flowers etc. The present incinerator, though fragile, is "still standing". Replacing it with a chimneyed dustbin was rejected as these soon wear out. Mike Malster, an allotment grandee, said that it is he who maintains the incinerator, and that it is still serviceable. For the moment there needs to be no action. It was perhaps the longest meandering inconclusive debate that we in the public gallery had ever witnessed. We just looked at each other in astonishment.

At the end of the meeting Steve revealed that he had obtained three good litter bins from Martin Meade who had no further use for them. Just the thing for the Village Hall, Steve thought, and deposited them out side the Village Hall door. He then emailed the Chairman with the good news. After so much effort and initiative it is always disappointing to receive the prompt reply – "Thanks, but no thanks". Undaunted, Steve will now put two in the children's play area. That leaves one more to get rid of. Villagers are advised to keep their front gates closed.

Sage advice



Whether used as a culinary herb, grain or bedding perennial, the genus *Salvia* has a versatile relationship within many human cultures. It is the horticultural value that stands out for me - diverse and vibrant blooms on scented foliage, which come into their own during the longer summer days in British gardens.

The genus contains nearly a thousand species, and finds its highest diversity in Central and South America, with the Mediterranean Basin and Himalaya also displaying large species counts. The unifying characteristic of these species is the presence of a pair of hinged stamens, which form a staminal lever on the male part of the flower. This unusual pollination mechanism is activated by a visiting bird or bee. A nose around in the flowers on your common-old garden sage (*Salvia officinalis*) should allow activation of this lever, which under the right circumstances

daubs the back of the pollinator with pollen.

The species which cause most excitement tend to be from the New World. Many

of these have colourful tubular flowers, such as Salvia fulgens, Salvia guaranitica and Salvia concolor or the deep purpleblack of Salvia discolour- all of which are flowering in the Garden's Glasshouse Bays at the moment. William Robinson wrote of another Salvia species, the Mexican species S. patens, "doubtless, the most brilliant in cultivation, being surpassed by and equalled by few other [garden] flowers". Rather than



bees, these New World cousins are geared up for hummingbirds, and the queen amongst this group is the giant Bolivian sage, *S. dombeyi*, from the high Andes, with 8cm, vivid scarlet pendent blooms.

Hopefully, this has wetted your appetite for the genus *Salvia*, which is much more than sage and chia. Many salvia species will be flowering right into September at the Garden, providing some late-summer, colourful and inspirational ideas for the home garden.

The Speaker at our July meeting was Geoff Lambert who came to **INSPIRING WOMEN** talk about medical detection dogs, bringing with him a very talented springer spaniel called Buddy who is specially trained to detect changes in blood sugar levels in Brittle Type 1 diabetes. This is a particularly debilitating form of the disease with a daily risk of coma. The Charity 'Medical Detection Dogs' works on two fronts, one trains and supplies dogs to support people on an individual basis and the other is in researching methods to detect certain cancers either through breath or urine samples. It is also hoped that the technique can be extended to include Parkinson's disease and early warning for seizures. We could see much more involvement of our canine friends in future non-invasive screening programmes.

In August we meet on 15th in the Village Hall at 7:30 when one of our very talented members, Gill Rushworth, will be talking about her embroidery. We will then have social time with refreshments, competitions and raffle.

Bowel Cancer Prevention: Bowel cancer, also known as colorectal cancer, is one of the most common cancers, accounting for over 10% of all cancers in England. Every 15 minutes someone is diagnosed with bowel cancer in the UK. Public Health England has published a resource on bowel cancer prevention https://www.gov.uk/...preventing-bowel-cancer/health-matters-improving-the-prevention and diagnosis. It includes information about the prevalence of the condition, dietary and lifestyle factors that increase the risks of developing it and advice on early detection. Just over half (54%) of bowel cancer cases in the UK are linked to lifestyle risk factors. Diet plays a major role in bowel cancer risk. The evidence has been steadily growing around the risks of eating large amounts of red meat and processed meats, such as sausages, bacon, ham and salami.

On Friday 1st July pupils and staff from Swaffham Prior took part in the service at Ely Cathedral to commemorate the Battle of the Somme. It was a very moving service. After processing into the Cathedral behind the Royal British Legion banners and a bag-piper, our pupils sang two of the songs



which would have been sung by British Soldiers at the time. Mr Godfrey and pupils joined senior military representatives and local dignitaries in reading texts about the battle, many written by the soldiers themselves. The Swaffham Prior pupils represented their generation really well showing great respect for the soldiers who fought for the freedoms we benefit from today. After the service, they joined pupils from Ramsey Primary School in performing some Molly Dances outside the Cathedral, to show the happier traditions of the countryside at the time of the First World War.

Last week, I enjoyed the school production of 'The Mystery of Magpie Manor'. A musical whodunit, with theft, fraud and impersonation. Fortunately a renowned

author, Agatha Christie, was on hand to solve the case and as an added benefit the long lost family treasure was found whilst hunting for the stolen property. The pupils gave a rousing performance which was much enjoyed by everyone who came.

On a smaller scale, the Reception pupils took Assembly this week. They showed us all the importance of building strong foundations by acting out the story of the 'Three Little Pigs'. They worked well together as a team, acted their parts brilliantly and sang really well.

Ely Southern By Pass

The Government will shortly be confirming the funding for this project. We can then announce our preferred contractor. This will be a design and build contract with a start date of approx November 2016 and completion date of November/ December 2017.



Council Meeting

On 28th June I attended a full council meeting mainly to discuss two issues

1) The new district Leisure Centre at Ely

The Leisure Centre would have the following facilities-

An eight lane 25m swimming pool

A learner pool

A 120 station gym

Two dance studios

A four court sports hall

A 3G all weather pitch

The preferred contractors to build the new Leisure Centre is a company called Pellikaan. The preferred contractors to operate the facilities on the Councils behalf once open are GLL – a large trust operating at 222 sites on behalf of 45 local authorities or similar clients, including Cambridge City Council.

The budget for the project is £13,500,000. The majority of this funding will come from capitol receipts or borrowing. Financially it should be cost neutral for construction and operation.

2) The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Devolution Proposal

The devolution deal includes new un-ring fenced funding under a single pot (£600 million over 30 years, £20 m per annum) for infrastructure and economic growth; £100 million capitol grant (out to 2020/21) for the delivery of new homes and developed budgets for key route network of roads and local transport. An additional £70 million capitol ring fenced for Cambridge to address the exceptional housing market conditions.

James Palmer, our Council Leader has negotiated the inclusion of key infrastructure projects in the deal document fir consideration. Specifically: CLT scheme for Kennett, CLT development as a whole, Soham railway station including double tracking and reinstatement of the loop 'Newmarket Curve', Ely North junction improvements, Ely Southern bypass, A14/A142 junction and upgrades to the A10.

I have been involved in several local issues this last month, mainly planning matters.



From our Local County Councillor David Brown

June 2016

The main issue at the County Council in June has been the debate over devolution of powers from Government to a combined authority for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, with a directly elected Mayor. After a long debate Council agreed by a majority vote to go to public consultation on the proposed deal.

The proposed deal includes 170 million pounds for housing over the next 5 years together with 600 million pounds over 30 years for infrastructure improvements across the County, including items like the A142/A14 junction. Funding for skills and adult learning would also be devolved to the proposed combined authority together with certain powers over roads and transport.

Personally I believe the proposed deal to be worthwhile but I urge you all to have your say in the consultation. The consultation is available on the County Council website - www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk.

July 2016

Full Council met on 19th July. A petition was received regarding City Deal proposals for widening Milton Road, which would result in the loss of a number of trees. Following debate it was agreed to refer the petition to the City Deal Board. Council also considered and approved the Treasury Management Strategy. A motion was debated and supported regarding the need for tolerance across the County following recent reports of racial incidents.

The Children and Young People Committee met. The Committee supported applications to create 2 Free Schools, a new primary school in Chatteris, an a new Special School associated with the Meadowgate School in Wisbech. A report was tabled regarding the work of the Corporate Parenting Board (which I chair) and the Committee also considered a Finance and Performance report.

General Purposes Committee also met in July. As well as the usual Finance and Performance Reports, the Committee considered reports regarding the Total Transport Pilot proposal based in and around Ely, the business case for developing a company to supply agency workers in conjunction with Suffolk County Council, a consultation strategy and provisions for the County Council elections in 2017...

I also attended a business planning seminar for Children and Young People Committee, a GPC/SMT Business Planning Workshop, a member seminar regarding early consideration of setting up community hubs, and a meeting with Burwell Sports Centre regarding issues with the car park.

Work is progressing with the Ely Southern by-pass, with funding in place and work expected to start on site in November/December 2016 and completion by end 2017.

Notes from Parish Council July Meeting

John Covill chaired the meeting with 8 Parish Councillors and 9 members of the public in attendance. The meeting started at 7.30pm.

Members' Declaration of Interest for Items on the Agenda + Requests for Dispensation: None.

Public Participation:

It was noted that the public interest was in the planning applications and so could be handled under that item.

Reports

CCC Matters: Cllr David Brown reported to the meeting. The main issue was the debate over devolution of powers form Government to a combined authority for Peterborough a Cambridge. It has been decided to go to public consultation and there will be formal meeting in October. He urged people to have their say in the debate. More is available on the Webtie: www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk

ECDC Matters: Cllr Allen Alderson reported to the meeting including, that he does not want the devolution David Brown was discussing being mainly for CCC's benefit. Andrew Camps added the project to add the Cambridge Loop rail link will allow access to Cambridge from Soham. Allen Alderson handed out copies of the devolution agreement projects. David Brown added that although the cost of the rail link was high, the project would very likely receive funds from other sources as with the A142-A14 junction, where it was possible the Earl of Derby may assist with funding.

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

David Greenfield had received feedback from the reply to the Parish Conference 2 June follow up. He thanked Paul Latchford for the information he had provided. There are 2 more parts that are not up for comment by the PC, published June 24th. David Greenfield gave an update on the response and current state including green spaces; they had accepted the PC's entries but as with the other areas, had input from other sources resulting in 3 additional areas: The field known as Dencora, the land at the top of the village (also in the housing development list) and at the end of Lower End, the Pump House Field. The Development envelope has the PC's proposed change near to Rogers Road / Lower End but 4 more changes were proposed.

Correspondence for Circulation / Consideration

All correspondence was noted including the PC agreed to contact or pass on any local residents details who may own a pumping station to report back to Anglian Water.

Consideration of Planning Applications Received:

There were no objections to the application for 36 Mill Hill.

The Application for construction of 4 bedroom, two storey detached dwelling behind 65 High Street was discussed at length and the meeting was suspended to allow members of the public to provide comment. The conclusion was a number of serious concerns and objections including: backfill development would not normally (currently) be passed, access and egress issues, overlooking existing properties gardens and windows, the elevation would make it on a level with the churches and

hence change the character of the village. Questions were raised regarding services, especially sewage as it would probably join a sewer, already congested, that crosses a local residents land. It was also noted that the proposed "drive" is in the middle of one and opposite another, bus stop. There was concern about the extensive removal of trees and hedges in a conservation area, the access is not a road and allowing for 18 tonne vehicles so close to existing 18th century buildings may cause damage. Further comments were requested before the end of the following week. It was decided to enter a strong objection.

CIL Money Projects

Steve Kent-Phillips reported on progress with the projects recommended by the village at the AVA. He covered the 7 current projects most of which were progressing as expected.

Refurbish the path from St. Cyriac's to be back gate: a new quote had been received for £5250 from **Mead Construction.** The PCC has agreed to share the cost with the PC and Martin Mead. The PC agreed to pay the 1/3 share of £1750 as all previous concerns had been resolved.

The Cemetery Spoil Heap: has been removed. After an estimate of up to £10K the actual bill for this was £2040. It was agreed to get Mead's to quote for further work to replace topsoil, landscape the site and repair path edging.

The Clerk will send letters to request grave diggers take spoil away in future or accept that the PC will get the work done and present them with the bill.

Street Lighting: The light outside the school has been removed for some reason it should not have been on a telegraph pole but the school has said that their new security lighting make it redundant in any case. The Clerk will adjust the asset register and inform ECDC and the insurance company. Paul Latchford covered the recent news on Fairview Grove Lights. Apparently 2 of them now need attention. Paul Latchford noted that Electrical Testing were standing by their original quotes now around a year old. They can do 2-3 lights per day and expect to be able to replace the remaining lights in 3 days. It was agreed the project cost of less than £7.5K should go ahead, which is to replace all remaining lights.

Telephone Box: We are now in possetion of the Box and a nice 'phone box owners pack. The Swaffham Prior Box is a rare one as it was installed to commemorate the George the V silver jubilee. It is a K6 (kiosk number six) 1935 designed by Giles Gilbert-Scott. Plans to install the defibrillator including the training, materials, Web site (for Red Cross to see we have one) insurance and electricity, the estimate was £2K, the actual cost is £1721. It was agreed to proceed. Steve Kent-Phillips said we had requested quotes to refurbish the box. Most had declined, one was £900 but Andy Marin, who had worked on the Burwell boxes, had presented a quote for £300. Steve said that he had a source for materials (over and above those supplied in the "kit") from the company that is the original parts supplier. It was agreed to purchase the required parts and get Andy to do the refurbishment.

The (only current) additional project was discussed. *The School Swimming Pool Changing Facility*; It seems that FoSPS have some resources, including a builder, willing to help with the project. It can be done over the Easter Holidays. It was

suggested that this was the replacement for the Youth Club Hut project. It was agreed that before proceeding with any projects, that had not been part of the original consultation and decision process, the PC should consult the village and ask for any further suggestions that should be considered. It was particularly noted that new projects would not include those already considered. Paul Latchford agreed to create a letter or notice for The Crier.

Agree further support for Queen's 90th Birthday Party

It was agreed to provide a further £100 towards the birthday party account. The PC agreed that the party was a great success and such events and their organisers should be encouraged.

Cemetery, Allotments & Grass Cutting

Cemetery Fence: Andrew Camps reported the stat of the fence between the cemetery and the allotments was poor and looking untidy. The left had section (as you go in) was not fully supported. There was some discussion about access to the allotments and that someone had been reported using the cemetery tap (PC water) for watering or washing a horse. The Clerk agreed to get quotes to repair the fence.

Cemetery Incinerator: Andrew Camps reported recovering the old carrot wash that had been used as an incinerator for some years. Michael Malster agreed to tidy it up.

Cemetery Shed: Andrew Camps reported the poor state of at least the door hinges and probably the doors. Steve Kent-Phillips confirmed that the shed was owned by the PC. The Clerk agreed to get quotes for relevant repairs including the addition of a brick or concrete apron for the doors to open over.

Grass Cutting: The Clerk reported general improvements in CGM's attention to the cutting areas but it was pointed out by Peter Hart that they had not done the width of the verge near the orchard and the cemetery left had side was still in need of cutting. The Clerk agreed to circulate via the Web site, the cutting areas map and pictures of missed cuts for the PC to comment on. An email or letter would be sent to CGM. It was agreed not to pay the initial invoice for the year from CGM.

Accounts for payment

These were all agreed with the exception of the grass cutting contractor's March April invoice.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk reported more discussions with the grass cutting contractor. The agreed areas to be cut would be published and a map of missed areas sent for explanation and correction. The original agreement will be reiterated and a copy published. There had been no reply from CCC regarding the Station Road bollards so a new email and or letter would be sent, possibly copied to higher officials in Highways. Thanks to David Brown for the CCC list. The village maintenance contribution from CCC had now been invoiced at £504.36. Two road closure notices had been received; one for Cage Hill for the 3rd of August and various closures of Headlake Drove/Straight Drove/Harrisons Drove for short periods from 4th July, for 18 months. These are mostly to do with resurfacing. Cage Hill is for Anglian Water to connect water to the new builds. The Clerk reported having spoken to UK Power networks about how to get balls, Frisbees and assorted throwing toys out of the

transformer enclosure next to the school playground. The contact number to report low grade "emergency" call outs was passed to Sandra Gynn.

Parish Councillors' Reports

Sandra Gynn reported having attended governor's meetings and that the school will now be getting a new assistant female head, so there will no longer be any male teachers at the school after September. She wished Gordon all the best as he was moving away to Wales.

Steve Kent-Phillips reported recovering 3 litter bins destined for the bin. He suggested redistributing them (mostly) around the play area. Andrew Camps reported an overhanging hedge in Lower End. The Clerk agreed to send and email or letter to the owner.

Open Question Time

There was a discussion about kerbs and what the 3 scruffy bins were outside the village hall. The amount received in the accounts for cemetery fees was noted and the insurance value of the Swaffham Prior (rare) Telephone box for insurance.

CIL and Open Spaces Projects - Suggestions Please

As a result of the building works on Roger's Road, the Parish Council has been awarded two significant grants: an Open Spaces grant of £37,600 and a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) grant of £32,000. To date, Open Spaces money has been allocated for repairing the path from St Cyriac's Church to the rear churchyard gate, a roundabout in the play area, and removing the spoil heap in the cemetery. CIL money is being used to replace the nine remaining yellow street lights with white, purchase and restore the telephone box, and survey the Youth Club hut with a view to upgrading it.

After completion of these projects surplus sums remain available for community use. Therefore the Parish Council would like further suggestions from members of the public as to how these sums can best be used to fund community projects. This is a significant opportunity for the community and we would like to ensure that we have considered all suggestions put forward by the public.

Please ensure that your suggestions reach the Parish Council by the end of September 2016.


