From our Reporter

George Hurrell issued an interesting challenge in the last *Crier* in response to Russell Arnott's comment about our "monoculture farmland". He is offering a

Farm Walk to show that Newton Farms is working to the "highest environmental scheme possible." All 50 acres of the "floristically enhanced grass margins", etc. It is to be hoped that Mr Arnott, and also possibly Mr Lewinsky, will take up this kind offer and then write separate pieces for the *Crier* about their findings. Interestingly, just the other day, Alan Titchmarsh advised against rewilding domestic gardens claiming "that rewilding gardens is a catastrophe for wild life and will reduce diversity."



While on the Farm Walk I hope they note the number of insects. In this country, flying insects have declined 60% in 20 years. In Germany they have declined 75% in 26 years. And globally all insect species are declining with one third now endangered. Potentially disastrous. This is already noticeable in our daily lives. No longer are flies a nuisance in hot weather. There are now so few they must be treasured, even perhaps the blue bottle. Without a dog or a cat a small fly can become a sociable companion as it lands next to you at the table, perhaps exploring your hand or the book you are reading. With great sensitivity it never touches the glass of white wine. A small fly can just be a friendly, curious, warm hearted companion for a time. He is such a chipper little chap. Big flies do not have the same attraction.

ladies on the Committee. Kate Muscroft has joined. The Pankhurst Family and all the other brave ladies did not labour in vain. The PC also ran a very successful Annual General Assembly as recorded in Jude's excellent report in the last *Crier*. It was well attended, gave news about all the village organisations, and was the perfect place to ask questions.

Mind you questions at our PC meetings are not nearly as lively and challenging as those at Reach PC meetings. Their meetings can be dynamite and I have recently been alerted to this. The online edition of its magazine *Within Reach* gives a very full extensive record of their meetings. In the first few months of this year a resident demanded a step by step review of how the PC reached its decision and that three councillors should not be part of that review; that the draft minutes were "riddled with

errors"; that there is "no confidence in the integrity of the PC"; that they "lacked trust in the PC", while, so I hear, there was also much personal abuse about some of the councillors. How about that for a story, if anyone is interested in such "tittle tattle" just look at *Within Reach* online. I haven't seen a printed copy.

That really great Village Feast reminded me that once it always opened with a Fun Run. This three or four mile run started down Station Road and then round the fen. Refreshments were provided half way round. Many joined the fun just by walking it. This is unlikely to happen again. But we could follow Madrid and have a 100 or 200 yard High Heels Race up the High Street. The Spanish rule is the heels must be at least 15cm (5.9in) high. Perhaps a little less for us in the first year. But what a Feast it would be, starting with the High Heels Race and ending with the Egg Throwing. Over to the Village Hall Committee.

It is so worrying that Starmer is thinking of enforcing section 40 of the Leveson Enquiry which would impose all costs for any claim against newspapers, whether found guilty or not. This would be such a threat to press freedom. Ever since the middle of February, when the Times began it's "Clean it up Water Campaign", the dire water and sewage situation has been fully exposed. There was nothing new about it. Everything had been known for years, yet no one (and this includes so many from all quarters) had fully exposed it. All newspapers have made important exposures at some time – the *Guardian*, the *Mail*, *Telegraph*, the *Mail*, even the *Mirror*. We need the freedom of the press. The next full exposure will be the National Grid, which is just waiting in the wings. In less than twelve months I predict.

Of course we know that the Press can go to unforgivable extremes as Prince Harry and the others are claiming having been brought together by the astute lawyers. But, nothing is perfect. Prince Harry's claims have just been dismissed by the judge as silly.

A ragbag of trifles for the summer holidays. Bedbugs are on the rise in French hotels and houses, and across Europe. They have no respect for social class, and like to travel. Don't bring them back. Prince George was ten in July, and it is always quite alarming how quickly the young do age. Extremely disturbing. But some things become easier and a recent TV ad offered Christmas Gift Ideas which will "Take the stress out of Christmas Shopping". Everyone should now feel better knowing that. But Andrex are at it again. To keep their rolls at the same price they had already reduced the number of sheets in a roll. They are now shrinking the size of each sheet, still keeping to the same price. One unhappy customer had calculated that this will result in ten fewer visits per roll. Finally, it is very worrying that soap sales have shrunk by 40%, particularly with Covid on the rise again. Just be very careful who you shake hands with.

County Broadband - Update

In our April edition we carried an advert for fast fibre broadband coming to the village. We've since had a visit from Matthew Briggs on behalf of County Broadband (https://countybroadband.co.uk/) who are planning to offer a service starting here early next year. They are offering a similar scheme to the Heating Project whereby those who sign up early get a very good deal but in their case the threshold to go ahead is 20% of households signed up by the end of August and they'd already reached 18% when we spoke to him a few weeks ago so it looks very likely it will go ahead. Work has already started in Bottisham and Swaffham Bulbeck.

The details are on their web page but speeds are impressive with options between 100Mb/s and 900Mb/s and plenty of bandwidth (100Gb/s) into the village to provide this. Their plan is to use a mixture of BT ducts and overhead connections to houses, i.e. much the same as the existing phone cabling but with fibre rather than copper cabling. This will avoid yet more roadworks but it would have been good if everything could have been moved underground along with the heating scheme's pipes but the timescales didn't match. If you're interested and haven't already done so, you need to get in touch with Matthew (07538399740) quite quickly to beat the end of August deadline.

Prospects Trust—Snakehall Farm



We love our Volunteers! This summer we wanted to shout out to everyone who has played a part in our 34th year of The Prospects Trust, and as we near our milestone 35th year of Growing Differently there is still time to volunteer your time, talents or team to really make a difference to our little corner of Cambridgeshire.

This summer we have seen a record number of hosted Corporate Volunteering days, with more to come. So far these work parties have planted our seasonal squashes, harvested our garlic and really laid the foundations to our Woodland Nature Reserve in the bottom field. Julie's Recipes: A taste of the Caribbean Jamaican Jerked Chicken

25g allspice berries
2 inch cinnamon stick
1 tsp grated nutmeg
1 fresh red chilli, finely chopped
4 spring onions, thinly sliced
1 bay leaf, crumbled
Salt and ground black pepper
1 tbsp dark rum
6 chicken joints or thighs

Pineapple chutney

2 fresh pineapples, peeled and chopped
1 inch fresh ginger, peeled and finely chopped
1 onion, finely chopped
1 fresh red chilli, seeded and finely chopped
125ml vinegar
250g dark brown sugar

To make the jerked seasoning, pound the allspice berries and all the dried ingredients together in a mortar, or grind in an electric grinder. Add the chilli, spring onions, bay leaf and continue pounding into a thick paste.

Stir the rum into the paste and mix well. Slash the chicken deeply on the skin and rub the seasoned paste over the chicken, Cover and leave in the fridge for a couple of hours.

Meanwhile make the pineapple chutney. Put all the ingredients in a saucepan and stir well. Place over a moderate heat and stir until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to a boil, cook vigorously until the chutney thickens.

Pour the chutney into sterilized jars and seal. Roast the Jerked chicken at 200c for 20-30 minutes until golden brown. Serve with the pineapple chutney and Rice.

Rice and peas

250g dried red kidney beans,
600ml coconut milk
2 sprigs of fresh thyme
2 spring onions, finely chopped
1 fresh green chilli, seeded and finely chopped
500g long grain rice
Salt and freshly ground pepper

- 1. Put the dried kidney beans, leave to soak in cold water overnight, the following day rinse and drain well. Put the kidney beans in a large pan and add 900ml boiling water. Cook for 30 mins until the beans are tender.
- 2. Add the coconut milk, thyme. Spring onions and chilli to the pan, season well and bring back to a boil for 5 minutes.
- 3. Add the rice and stir well, cover and simmer on a low heat until the rice is tender and the liquid has been absorbed. Any remaining liquid can be drained.
- 4. Transfer to a serving dish and serve with the Jerked chicken and pineapple chutney.

Snippets from the Heating Project

Craig Middleton from Bouygues, the Heating Project's main contractor, paid us a post installation visit the other day and we discovered a few interesting things about how the system works:

- We'd noticed on one occasion that the input temperature was mid 50s °C, well below the guaranteed supply temperature. They confirmed that this was the case and was because they'd been performing tests to optimise the system now that they had some load from attached houses. They've since done another similar test but this time they emailed everyone in advance.
- They've been monitoring particulate emissions in the village over the last year and will continue to do so for some time to come to see if there's a measurable decrease, and/or change in the mix, as a result of the drop in the use of oil burning.
- The metering is smart, i.e. it can be read remotely, and is accredited by the Renewable Heat Initiative (RHI), so of guaranteed accuracy. Unlike smart electricity meters which send the readings over their own private network, the Heating Project uses the mobile phone network, sending regular updates. Neither needs to make any use of WiFi.
- The flow rate through the external pipe-work is varied to cope with the demand. Judging by the time it takes these pipes to heat up when it turns on, the flow rate is pretty low at the moment as one would probably expect with little call for heat for central heating. The flow rate in the house's hot water and central heating systems is independent of this, it just affects how rapidly heat can be transferred to the house.
- The hot water tanks at the plant on the Heath Road store enough heat to keep the system running for 24 hours under the anticipated load, were anything to go wrong with the heat pumps, etc.

News from Wicken Fen Nature Reserve September

By early September, most swallows are preparing to migrate, and we often see them clustered in groups on telegraph Many birds are wires. leaving their breeding grounds to head south for the winter, but there's still plenty to see around the reserve. Many dragonflies are still on the wing, including the larger migrant hawker, southern hawker and emperor. There should also still be



the purple globes of devil's bit scabious amongst the wildflowers still in bloom.

Did you know that Wicken Fen is home to 24 species of dragonfly and damselfly? We'll be hosting free pop-up dragonfly walks with the British Dragonfly Society in August and September – keep an eye on our social media channels for the next dates.

Message from the Heating Swaffham Prior Team – July 2023

Connections update

Connections are being made each week and from the middle of July we have 78 external pipework connections installations completed and of these properties we have 37 customers whose heat and hot water are now provided by the heat network.

The contractor has reinstated the surfaces around properties to a high standard and on the couple of occasions where there have been minor issues, the team has returned to sort this out swiftly.







Further connections

Works are currently taking place on Lower End and then the contractor will be moving to Mill Hill to complete some external connections. If you have not been connected yet or would like to be connected to the heat network please get in touch, our email is below.

Ground Source and Air Source Heat Pumps & Renewable Heat Incentive Accreditation

The Ground Source and Air Source Heat Pumps at the Energy Centre have been officially commissioned and are certified fully functional. This was necessary to achieve the Government's Renewable Heat Incentive Accreditation.

To meet government standards, we had to undertake some testing of the system. This is highly unlikely to have been noticeable to those on the heat network however we made sure to notify customers ahead of time. We are still having positive feedback from our new customers that their system is working well and they have plenty of hot water.

You may notice some Bouygues Energies and Services staff around the village over the next month taking photos of the front of some customer homes. This is also a requirement for us to claim the Renewable Heat Incentive, so please don't be concerned if you see them out and about. Please feel free to ask these individuals for their work badges if you would like reassurance of their purpose. All Bouygues staff have been asked to wear their company high vis, so they are easily identifiable.





The Reading Group Reads...

Trial and Retribution by Lynda La Plante

The disappearance of young child is every mother's nightmare and this is the case in Lynda La Plant's crime thriller Trial and Retribution. Little Julie Anne Harris is the young victim. found murdered the police investigation leads to a local man whom the police believe is responsible for the heinous crime committed on the little girl. However during the investigation other suspects are uncovered and it is this aspect of the book and the meticulous description of the police investigation and the criminal court proceedings which makes this book such a good read - an opinion felt by some of the Book Group but certainly not all. Some felt that the characters in the book ranging from a distraught mother, a traumatised police officer, an ambitious young solicitor, a vain barrister



and a despicable step father, were lacking in conviction. However exploring such a difficult theme as child abduction, sexual assault and murder, as well as domestic violence, this is a dark and intense thriller. Despite the heaviness of its subject matter, it's a fully immersive and fascinating novel - relentless and gripping from the start through to its tense conclusion as the verdict is read and the reader is left to decide if justice has been served.

Dispensary Newsletter:

On the 1st April 2023 the (DHSC) Department of health and social care, introduced a prescription prepayment card (PPC) to reduce the cost of (HRT) hormone replacement therapy. If you pay for more than two HRT prescriptions a month the HRT PPC will save you money.

Each item on an NHS Prescription is £9.65, you can buy an HRT PPC for a one-off payment for a year of £19.30 (the cost of two prescription items) not all HRT medication is covered by an HRT PPC please check the NHSBSA website for a list of medications covered by the HRT PPC

From our District Councillors Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

There will be a Youth Fusion Event at Bottisham Sports Centre on Wednesday 9 August 2023 Anyone aged 18 or under is invited to attend this free event taking place between 11am and 3pm. This interactive well-being event is an opportunity to find out what is going on for young people. As well as fun activities such as a climbing wall, Korfeball and a bouncy castle, there will also be the chance to find out more about the clubs and organisations operating in East Cambridgeshire. A bike mechanic will also be available to offer advice on bike



maintenance and carry out basic repairs on the day free of charge, and the police will be offering bike security marking.

This event is part of the Council's Youth Engagement strategy, which was discussed at the Operational Services Committee in June. We also agreed the updated Environment Plan with the actions for the current year. The plan commits East Cambs to reducing the carbon from its operations by at least 80% by 2030. This is a welcome, but challenging target and there was no clear plan to achieve it, so we supported an amendment calling for officers to draft a plan for achieving the target. The meeting reviewed the finance report for the Committee's areas of responsibility and noted a revenue overspend of £742,000 – 13% of budget. Just under £500,000 of this overspend was the increased fee to ECSS for waste collections. There was an almost £3million underspend on capital, due to delays in programmes – notably the Disabled Facilities programme. In response to her question Charlotte was assured that the Council were taking actions to try to get this programme back on schedule, so that people with disabilities can have the necessary adaptations to their homes.

We also had a very interesting presentation from Voluntary and Community Action East Cambs. Although they are based in Ely, they are happy to help around the District – they offer a community transport scheme and a gardening scheme for people who need help with their gardens. Finance & Assets Committee in July noted that the Council as a whole had a revenue underspend of almost £2million and a capital underspend of almost £2million. The Committee appointed people to outside bodies and John was appointed to the Swaffham Internal Drainage Board.

The Combined Authority's Overview and Scrutiny Committee met in June and elected Charlotte as their Chair. The Committee had the opportunity to question the Mayor and his teams about their plans for Cambridgeshire. There is a new senior management team and they are planning to move initiatives forward, including supporting skills training and better

public transport.

Because of the Bank Holiday on 28 August, the waste collections in that week will be one day later than normal. We hope you all enjoy the Bank Holiday weekend and the Summer holidays.

There is no 'Meet your Councillors' in August because of holidays. The next meet you Councillors is on Wednesday 20 September at 6.30pm at Brinkley Memorial Hall.

Notes from the Parish Council July Meeting

Cllr Covill chaired a meeting of the Parish Council on Thursday 13th July, attended by 8 parish councillors and 1 member of the public.

Public participation.

It was noted that emails received did not always appear on the PC website, for example if containing confidential information or information that did not apply to the Swaffham Prior Parish.

Matters arising from previous minutes.

Cllr Greenfield had consulted with CGM regarding weed spraying of the cemetery path and received a quote £75 plus VAT, which the PC accepted.

Correspondence.

Email from Chippenham PC regarding lack of communication between Cllr Josh Schumann and PCs. The PC agreed in principle, suggesting that quarterly attendance in person or provision of a report would be a suitable amount of regular contact.

Emails from ECDC regarding availability of Pride of Place grant and East Cambs Community grants for projects.

Email from GCP representative regarding the results of the meeting on Tuesday 13th June. A virtual meeting had taken place between representatives of GCP, Cllrs Latchford and Greenfield; the GCP response to the meeting had been emailed and circulated. Cllr Greenfield had written a response for approval of the PC which was read out to the meeting, noting factual mistakes in the record of the meeting and again requesting a site visit. The PC agreed to send this response.

Repairs and restoration of five benches

Cllr Kent-Phillips explained that 3 PC-owned benches had needed repairs and the immediate proximity to them clearing (in one case of broken glass) for a cost of $\pounds 180.00$ – this had been agreed on the grounds of health and safety of members of the public. 5 more benches also need work. In total repairs and restoration to 5 benches were quoted to cost £230.00 by Viv Elston. The PC accepted this quote.

Co-option of a new councillor onto the Parish Council.

Kate Muscroft was co-opted to the Parish Council by a unanimous vote.

Letter sent to the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership regarding the proposed Greenways.

The PC noted that due to constraints of time, the response had been sent before this meeting, so without a signature from Swaffham Prior PC. The email had been copied to CCC councillors and to Lucy Frazer MP.

New plan of the B1102 allotments.

Cllr Latchford explained the current condition of the B1102 allotments and explained a plan to leave the three current plots as they are and clear and mark out three more. The PC agreed to this. Cllr Latchford will now get quotes to clear the three new plots of vegetation and will produce a map with the plots identified for the website. Once this is done, the clerk will be able to offer the unrented plot to those on the waiting list.

Letter from several PCs regarding a lack of interaction and/or

responsiveness from the CCC representative for the area.

The PC agreed to co-sign a letter once the contents were agreed, and suggested that a quarterly attendance/report from CCC would be an acceptable level of communication.

Report on Heating Scheme.

76 properties now have external works fitted and 36 are receiving heat from the heating scheme. Connections are now moving at a faster rate although there are still difficulties on the supply chain for some parts.

Cllr Latchford asked if further road closures would be necessary? Cllr Greenfield said he didn't know but if there are it should be minimal.

Clerk's Report.

The new playground equipment is expected to be completed on 7th August – installation date yet to be confirmed.

Parish Councillors' Reports.

Cllr Gynn noted that the winner of the Gay Bulleid Award had yet to be notified, due to confusion as to how this was done. The clerk is to notify the winner, update winners list on the back of the painting and then pass on to Cllr Covill for presentation.

Cllr Gynn also noted that the re-tarmacking of Lower End was due to the completion of all scheduled Heating Scheme attachments for that road.

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that following contact with County Broadband, he had been informed that the intention was to use BT ducting and had explained that this was not available for Greenhead Road, Adams Road and Tothill Road. Cllr Greenfield noted that where ducting was not an option, the intention was to have the majority of works along pavements and verges, therefore minimizing disruption to roads.

Cllr Greenfield had attended a meeting organized by the A-B1102 group, involving representatives of all the affected Parish Councils, to discuss reactions to PC interactions with the GCP. Only Swaffham Prior had not been offered a face-to-face meeting. (Update; a site visit has now been arranged).

A-B1102's proposed alternative bus system had reportedly caught the interest of politicians and is being discussed. A former Highways professional was looking into preparing a survey of what parishioners want from a transport system and A-B1102 ask that PCs promote responding to it once it is available.

Cllr Lambert noted that the footpath from Lower End to the old railway line is now very overgrown and volunteered to cut it back.

A member of the public noted changes to the collection times from the Greenhead Road post box. If anyone would like any further information on any of the above items, please contact the Clerk.

The next monthly Parish Council meeting will be on Thursday, 10th August 2023 starting at 7.30pm at the Village Hall. All are welcome to attend.
