From our Reporter

December thoughts

Our Parish Council now has another interesting question to consider as well as the Heating Scheme.

On 6th December Sustrans held a meeting in Burwell to discuss cycle routes. I am reliant for all the following on Jude's excellent PC minutes. The only gap is that it appears the conclusions of the Sustrans meeting was given in an "Appendix" – which I could not locate. It seems that two possible routes were proposed. One was along the old railway line though none of the owners of this have yet been approached. Agreement may be difficult. And the other is along the existing one along the B1102.

John Trapp favoured the railway route but John is a such cycling enthusiast that he finds it hard to appreciate that not everyone is able to cycle. About three years ago I discussed this with John and mentioned some of my difficulties. He thought none were any reason for my not jumping onto a bike. The mind boggles at the thought of a large number of geriatrics on the cycle paths.

The other route was that the path should come through the village. There were

the inevitable objections, though some PC members thought it a good idea. This is certainly going to make a lively village discussion and for a time will put the Heating Scheme into the shade.

I have not followed all the arguments for extending cycle paths throughout the nation. I can see that it is welcome for the relatively few serious cyclists on their racing machines, and also for families at the weekend, and for the retired who like gentle cycling exercise and viewing the countryside. And other small groups. But I think the aim is to get cars off the road. This would reduce carbon emissions in an effort to combat climate change. But how would this be in practice?

At peak time about 1,000 cars an hour pass along Mill Hill. Just suppose that just 40% of the drivers

and passengers are persuaded to cycle. It would make a wonderful cartoon. Extend in your mind the result of 400 cyclists every peak hour cycling along Mill Hill, along the new cycle path, with more being added as they make their way to Cambridge. What would be very helpful if Sustrans or its local representative would put a statement and report in the Crier with all the facts and intentions. Then the Village will be able to form views

There were no objections to the application for a private underground power cable from the North Angle Solar Farm to the Swaffham Prior Energy Centre. The route has yet to be decided. This is such a far cry from those early days when power for the Scheme was to be from a new gas pipe connection from somewhere near the A14. Such is progress. Steve asked David why the Scheme was having such a "slow attachment rate". David explained that there was a significant level of bureaucracy involved, but that it "should get slicker". What on earth could this unforeseen

bureaucracy be? The connection points are only a couple of feet away from the private property. It will certainly need to be "slicker" if they are going to meet Maggie's most recent completion date of June 2023.

As with Cycle Paths the Heating Scheme will at some point need to be reviewed in the "Big Picture". This has to come.

Nationally and internationally what a year it has been. For the last three or four years we had concluded at the end of each year that there has never such a bad one. 2022 is the worst yet and concluded with that dreadful storm in the America with temperatures achieving minus 45. Prior to that we had, amongst other happenings, Sue Gray at the start of the year, followed by the Ukranian War, then the Queen's jubilee, The Queen's death, the new King, the three Prime Ministers, all enlightened by Matt Hancock's antics, and the Meghan/Harry entertainments. The only thing missing was the Partygate enquiry.

Only the *Guardian* at the beginning of August showed any concern. Surely this was prime press material. Then on 27 November Sky News revealed all. The documents had been requested by the Privileges Committee in July. In spite of constant reminders and demands the documents were not passed to the Committee until 18th November. Now they have to be carefully gone through before the evidence sessions can begin. This will take us well into the New Year. The name Sue Gray will once appear once again. This matter will have gone full circle. In the meantime Boris earned £1million with his after dinner speeches.

Our congratulations must go to Charlotte Cane for having been selected as the Parliamentary candidate for South East Cambridgeshire. And at long last ECDC has agreed that dog waste can be put in the normal waste bins. Wales introduced this five years ago. Just as Wales was charging for plastic bags five years before Michael Gove introduced it here. At the time he received so much applause for this climate saving measure.

One cannot leave the old year without a positive wish for the new. Having just watched *Calendar Girls* I just wondered whether our increasingly vibrant WI would consider producing their own calendar. This was probably discussed by all WIs at the time, but it is nearly twenty years since the film. Surely worth a thought, and putting on the agenda.

January Thoughts

Potholes! Potholes! Potholes! Ten days of frost and up they pop. The AA reckons that it takes £39.80 just to fix one. So if one thousand it will cost the CCC £40,000.

But does it really cost £39.80 per pot hole? If we had a CCC representative we could ask him. What I always say is that if you take too many jobs you are bound to be hopeless at some.

A number of years ago John Covill, our PC Chairman, gave a detailed description of potholes being repaired in his neck of the woods. It was all recorded in the *Crier* but like so much other interesting village history and material this is probably lost forever. Unless someone wishes to trawl through all the back issues and create an index. Or, if ever OCR becomes so cheap and easy. Meantime I wonder if John could remember what he said. Be good to hear it again.

Climate Change continues to remain top of the agenda and will remain so. This is the second year of King Charles III reign, when he is now recognised as being a

true and brave early crusader against our abuse of the planet. Almost fifty years ago he was considered a bit of a nutter. Now it is only appropriate to remind people that he was not the first. In the second year of the reign of King Charles II in 1662 was published a work giving the same warnings. This was by John Evelyn, that great seventeenth century diarist. Dedicated to Charles II it is called:

FUMIFUGIUM:

or, the Inconvenience of the AER, and SMOAKE of LONDON dissipated. Together with fome REMEDIES humbly proposed by J.E. Efq; To His Sacred Majestie, and To the Parliament now Affembled. MDCLXI.

Coal was the villain and it was recognised then. Come the Industrial Revolution and the world's doom was sealed. Should not the National Trust and others track down all those grand houses and families who had an interest in coal mines. Should they not all be outed, and compensation sought where possible. Advent by Candlelight at the Churches of St Mary and SS Cyriac and Julitta

Ian de Massini and Cambridge Voices Sunday 27 November 2022

Twenty-seven years ago the unique Advent by Candlelight concert was first performed in Swaffham Prior and it was thrilling that this year, after a two year enforced break, we were once again able to celebrate the start of Advent with Ian de Massini and the Cambridge Voices, also marking the 30th anniversary of the choir. Being new to the Churches of St Mary and SS Cyriac and Julitta, I was not sure what to expect and I was enchanted by both the music and the readings, which not only threaded seamlessly together, but which also held a few surprises.

The readings explored the theme of Advent and encouraged us to question and challenge many of our conventional ideas. TS Eliot stood centre stage with several extracts from the Four Quartets. The relationship between men and time, the need for spirituality and the importance of consciousness and existence were touched upon. The poetry from John Piper, Denise Levertov and Emily Dickinson reminded us of the idea of choice, courage and freewill of acceptance when it comes to destiny and decision making. A more light-hearted reading was Fanthorpe's poem written from the point of view of the donkey. Even this encouraged us to think about Advent in a different light.

The candlelit interior of St Mary's was a magical backdrop to the choir's evocative rendition of *Vox clara ecce intonate* by Gabriel Jackson, who this year is celebrating his 60th birthday. *Autumn leaves*, arranged by Ian de Massini, was sung beautifully and the poignancy of the French lyrics was enchanting. The concert continued with a beautiful traditional English carol arranged by Ralph Vaughan Williams, yet another birthday celebrant born 150 years ago. Ian de Massini's arrangement of The Ukrainian Bell Carol brought the sounds of bells pealing into the church, followed by the moving and emotional Prayer for Ukraine with the music by Valentyn Silvestrov and words by Ian de Massini.

Before walking across to the rather chilly SS Cyriac and Julitta's Church we were held spellbound by a solo version of the traditional English folk-ballad, *Dives & Lazarus*. The clarity of the story telling together with the traditional tune, which many of us might know from The Star of the County Down, was mesmerising. The single voice was followed by the Cambridge Voices, which then crescendoed into the congregational hymn. Pure magic.

The acoustics in St Cyriac's were perfect for the compositions by the two late Renaissance composers, Thomas Tomkins (this year being the 450th anniversary of his birth) and Peter Philips. A final rousing congregational hymn nearly brought the concert to an end but not before the Cambridge Voices gave us their rendition of *I wanna sing!* By Ian de Massini, based on the melody of the Mexican pop-song, La Bamba. A toe-tapping and heartwarming end to a wonderful evening of Advent by Candlelight.

There are many people to thank for making this evening so special and making sure that this unique village event remains firmly on the Advent calendar. Thank you to Ian de Massini and Andrew Grant for putting together a programme in which the music and spoken words complemented each other beautifully. Thank you to the Cambridge Voices whose melodic tones painted so many pictures. Thank you to the

readers drawn from the village of Swaffham Prior and nearby. And a final thanks to the many people who provided the delicious mulled wine and mince pies, who helped with the tickets, the lighting and the programmes. All proceeds from the concert went to the invaluable work of the local branch of EMMAUS. The warmth of St Mary's was carried home with us all that evening.

To give you an idea of what you might expect, two recent recruits, Janet Willmott and Mandy Kingsmill, describe their experiences since beginning to learn in September.

Learning to ring the Bells!

We thought it would be fun, we thought it would be a challenge – we were right on both counts but had absolutely no idea just how much we were going to enjoy ourselves. An hour and a half practice session whizzes by when you are concentrating so hard. The focus on what you are doing allows no stray thoughts at all!

We started on the silent practice bell in the church tower at Swaffham Bulbeck under the patient, experienced and amazing tutelage of Gareth and Lesley. The emphasis is on learning the correct techniques and skills right from the start, so no bad habits are formed that will hinder progress as you move on from doing not only the back strokes or hand strokes (with lots of assistance) to attempting, and achieving, doing one, two then three or four complete pulls all on your own. The feeling of accomplishment is immense.

Initially we met twice a week to really get us off to a good start so we could get lots of practice and progress to a point where at the monthly group practice in St Mary's Swaffham Prior in January this year, we both rang in a round of six. We weren't brilliant, and certainly not faultless, but neither of us could believe what we had achieved in such a short space of time. Even when we weren't ringing, we learnt a lot, just watching the talented ringers that were there that evening. It has

certainly given us something to aspire to.

There are many opportunities to ring at other towers all over the country, it is a very social activity, and we are both looking forward to making the most of the numerous sessions that are held more locally once we are of a standard to be able to do so. One of the team sent a recent holiday snap of themselves ringing in the Cathedral in Cape Town – now there's a thought!

Come and join us, try it out – you won't regret it.

Julie's Burns Night Recipes

Haggis, Clapshot & Whisky sauce

500g haggis
500g floury potatoes, peeled and chopped
500g swede, peeled and chopped
50g butter
75ml cream
Salt and pepper
1 tbsp chopped fresh chives

For the whisky sauce 500ml double cream 2 tsp wholegrain mustard 1 tbsp Dijon mustard 2 tsp whisky ½ lemon, juice only

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C, wrap the haggis tightly in foil and bake in the oven for 45 mins -1 hour
- 2. Meanwhile boil the potatoes and the swede in separate saucepans until tender, drain and mash thoroughly. Add the cream, butter and seasoning, mix them both together, stir in the chopped chives, set aside and keep warm.
- 3. Now for the Whisky sauce. Heat the cream in a pan on a medium heat, add the mustards and whisky, simmer and cook for 2 minutes. Remove from the pan, season and then whisk in the lemon juice.
- 4. To serve, place the clapshot (potatoes) onto plates with a portion of haggis alongside and spoon over the whisky sauce.

Serves 4

Cranachan

50g pinhead oatmeal 350g double cream 1 tbsp honey 150g raspberry coulis 2 tbsp good malt whisky

- 1. Toast the oatmeal in a dry frying pan until it has darkened in colour. Remove from pan to cool.
 - 2. Whisk the cream with the whisky and the honey until it stands firm.
- 3. Assemble the dessert in either individual glasses or a large glass bowl, by forming layers of cream, coulis and oatmeal, to end with a layer of cream. Cover and allow to chill in the fridge for at least an hour.

Heating Scheme News—Connections Resume

We have started connecting customers to the heat network following the Christmas and New Year break. We are working on the installation at a couple of properties on Cage Hill and then will move to Green Head Road, Tothill Road and Adams Road. The outline schedule for the connections is shown below. We have a lot of connections to make and appreciate the patience of all our customers and members of the community as works take place. We will be connecting over 120 properties across the village to the heat network in the coming months and we will let customers know individually about any changes in the programme.

We have had great feedback from the first customers connected to the heat network. Customers are happy with the system and they have been pleased with the quality of the installation. Residents have found the controls easy to use and the units operate quietly. The system is keeping them warm - and has been throughout the recent spells of very cold weather. System users have also found that they have plenty of hot water.



From our District Councillors Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

Last month we informed residents that the District Council's Advice Bus would visit Burwell every Thursday morning and Bottisham every Thursday afternoon. Unfortunately, this did not happen regularly in December for a variety of reasons. Although we are assured it will be visiting regularly on Thursdays from January, we must advise anyone planning on visiting the Advice Bus to ring ECDC on 01353 665555 first to check it is coming. Alternatively, the CAB in Newmarket offers phone advice Mon-Fri 9.30am-3.30pm on 0808 278 7868, or drop-ins Monday, Tuesday and Thursday 9.30-2.30.



The Operational Services Committee received the Q1 (April to June) performance report on waste and street cleansing services—a reminder of how long it took the Council to get to grips with the problems which led to our rubbish not being collected.

- Overall performance of the waste collection service: target 90 per cent, quarterly performance 33 per cent
- Overall performance of the street cleansing service: target 90 per cent, quarterly performance 21 per cent

Even by Q2 (July to September) waste collection performance had only recovered to 58 per cent against a target of 90 per cent, and street cleansing to 48 per cent also against a target of 90 per cent. As well as inconvenience to residents, these problems meant the crews were asked to work significant overtime in order to catch up on missed collections. Its hard work collecting our rubbish, and the crews deserve and need their rest days – they shouldn't have to work those days for several weeks in a row.

Another report to the Operational Services Committee on the condition of housing in East Cambridgeshire has produced some interesting headline findings.

- There are 37,556 dwellings in East Cambridgeshire. 72 per cent are owner occupied, 15 per cent private rented, and 13 per cent social rented.
- 5,338 dwellings in the private sector have Category 1 Housing Health and Safety Rating System (HHSRS) hazards. This equates to 16 per cent of properties.
- 951 dwellings in the private rented sector have category 1 HHSRS hazards. This equates to 17 per cent of properties in the private rented sector.
- The average Simple SAP rating (checking energy performance) for all private sector dwellings in East Cambridgeshire is 58, which is worse than both England (60) and East of England (60). For owner occupied stock the figure is 57 and for private rented stock it is 61.
- The total cost of mitigating category 1 hazards in East Cambridgeshire's private

sector stock is estimated to be £20 million—16.5 million in the owner-occupied sector, and £3.6 million in the private rented sector.

- 10.7 per cent (3,487) of private sector dwellings, and 8.6 per cent (472) of private rented dwellings in East Cambridgeshire are estimated to have an EPC rating (based on Simple SAP) below band E.
- In the private sector stock, there are an estimated 4,680 dwellings with un-insulated cavity walls, and 3,251 dwellings with less than 100mm of loft insulation.
- Analysis of the energy efficiency variables indicates that the owner-occupied stock has the highest average figures for the majority of variables (Simple CO2, energy and heat demand). The key objectives of the policy are to
- Enable elderly, vulnerable and disabled people to live in comfort and security in their homes.
- Increase the proportion of private sector housing that is of a decent standard, with a focus on those that are occupied by vulnerable households.
- Reduce fuel poverty.
- Support initiatives to bring long term empty homes back into use.
- Provide accessible information to the public to enable them to obtain assistance and advice on all matters around housing disrepair and energy efficiency.

The report concludes: "It is therefore important for East Cambridgeshire to develop suitable targeted strategies, policies and schemes to tackle these issues, working proactively with different departments and partner organisations, using enforcement action, where appropriate.

The Council's Finance & Assets Committee agreed unanimously last month a new Interim Nature Recovery Network for East Cambridgeshire report and Biodiversity Net Gain document. The former document identifies a number of priority areas for biodiversity, namely Wicken Fen, the Ouse Washes and surrounds, Newmarket chalk grasslands, Chippenham Fen and River Snail, Breckland Edge, Soham grasslands, Boulder Clay woodlands, Chettisham Meadows to Ely North Country Park, and the river corridors of the Great Ouse, Cam, Lark, Little Ouse, and Soham Lode. The latter document is an interim working document prior to the implementation by the Government of mandatory Biodiversity Net Gain expected in late 2023. For January and February, we will be holding our Councillors' Surgeries by zoom, to save people coming out in the cold and the dark. February: The Combined Authority found £3.5m this year, to provide the funds to keep the number 11, and other buses running for 6 months when Stagecoach suddenly pulled the services. They will shortly be finalising their budget for 2023/24 and Charlotte was a substitute member on the Overview & Scrutiny Committee to review the draft budget. She was disappointed to find that only the £3.5m was included – only half what would be needed to keep the buses running for a year. She raised this and the rest of the Committee agreed to ask the Combined Authority to find at least £7m for each of the next to years to fund our bus services. This just maintains the current position, we still need improvements not least to get the number 11 stopping at Bottisham.

The Combined Authority is consulting on its bus strategy, with a closing date of Friday 24th February at 5pm - https://cambridgeshirepeterborough-ca.gov.uk/news/

<u>combined-authority-to-relaunch-6-week-bus-strategy-consultation/</u>. There have been a lot of consultations recently, but if we want better bus services we need to take every opportunity to make the case.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership Making Connections 2022 consultation closed on Friday 23 December. Around 23,000 responses were received, and the Greater Cambridge Partnership expects to publish a final report on the consultation outcomes and next steps, for consideration by its Board in June 2023.

The consultation is about proposals for public transport improvements, and better cycling and walking options, as well as about the element which has been most talked about—a congestion charge. We expect the proposals in the consultation, including the proposal for a congestion charge, to be significantly changed by the public response to the consultation. Indeed, we hope they will be, as we struggle to support them as they stand.

In December the Licensing Committee agreed to consult on the installation of CCTV in Taxis and Private Hire Vehicles, as set out by the Department for Transport. The consultation opened on December 19th and will end at 3pm on Monday 13th March 2023 - https://www.eastcambs.gov.uk/licensing/licensing-policies

There were some missed/late bin collections in January, because of problems with vehicles. The crews have worked overtime to catch up with the collections. If your collections are missed, please report that at - https://www.eastcambs.gov.uk/east-cambs-street-scene/report-missed-collection or call 01353 665555. You can also report it to us and we will chase it up for you.

Black bin bags are now being delivered to households. As we write, they have been delivered to about half of our villages – Lode, Reach, Swaffham Bulbeck and Swaffham Prior. They should be delivered to everyone by 31 January. If you haven't received yours, please report it to us and we will chase it up for you.

Notes from the SP Parish Council December Meeting

Cllr Covill chaired the December meeting of the Swaffham Prior Parish Council, attended by 7 Parish Councillors and 1 member of the public.

Reports

East Cambridgeshire District Council – report circulated prior to meeting. Cllr John Trapp attended as representative. Cllr Trapp noted that the Community bus would not be in Burwell on 16th December and that he was involved in getting the bus to visit Swaffham Bulbeck as this would fit better with the current public transport bus routes. Cllr Trapp stated he is also looking into grants of money for new playground equipment.

Matters arising from previous minutes

Cllr Greenfield noted in response to a question, that the cost of the Heating Scheme has been £10.6 million. In response to a second question, the back-up boilers are electric.

Clerk's report

A) Sustrans meeting 6th December 2022 2.30-4pm Gardiner Hall, Burwell Present: Sustrans, Fordham, Reach, Burwell, Swaffham Prior, ECDC

Sustrans are a charity, a collection of engineers, designers etc who want to improve the cycle network. They were asked to look at schemes for the area. ECDC putting money into developing cycle/walking routes, also involved in Cambridgeshire Greenways.

Local Transport Note 1/20 = guidance for best practice on designing these routes e.g. segregation of cyclists/cars/pedestrians, minimum width of 3m, sealed surface, proscribed width of segregation depending on volume and speed of traffic etc. Target of 50% walking/cycle journeys by 2030 – needed for climate targets but mainly aimed at urban areas; need much higher funding to cover rural.

Active Travel England police what is done by Highways and Local Authorities – if doesn't comply with guidelines, all funding has to be repaid.

Swaffham Prior to Burwell or SP-Reach-Burwell proposed routes:

- 1) Most direct route is B1102, other most direct route involves using the old train track. B1102 will require buying of private land to get separation required for busy, fast road, difficulties crossing the dyke (can't cut through, heritage may object to expensive bridge), difficulties moving through villages themselves as narrow twisty roads don't allow for segregation. Suggested one way system in Burwell using Isaacson Road, Newmarket Road, High Street triangle.
- 2) Old train track: Highly protected ecology/habitat high risk that planning would refused after expensive surveys, environmental reports etc BUT it is the obviously route separate from road, direct, one of 3 places where dyke is breached (other 2 in Reach and at B1102). Suggestion of using cinder to make track as that is part of the unique habitat there already and would not require as much digging or use of tarmac. Sustrans suggested this could be looked at if there was enough support

There was also discussion of routes between Burwell-Fordham-Soham Station and Wicken-Soham

Need to persuade people – perhaps with mock-ups of segregated roads would look like, recognisable examples of where similar set-ups have worked.

Need for fully integrated systems e.g. hubs where can cycle to, then get train/bus.

Need to entice people to use rather than force them out of cars. Good system will be used, poor system will not and need to be accessible at as many as possible for good cost/benefit.

Also need crossing to Waterbeach Station, particularly if Cambridge North is within the congestion zone.

What were ECDC looking for? Projects they can invest in that will give results. Can't fund whole projects but could contribute to preparation for applying to those who can.

Next steps:

- Need short, medium and long term ideas can get "quick fixes" while working on other projects.
- Don't think of cycling in isolation; joined up, speed reduction schemes, consult with all, get CCC on board.
 - Choose preferred routes and look at how to get them.
- 5 years proposed before congestion charges arrive, so need to find solutions in that time.

Cllr Trapp noted that the railway route seemed the obvious choice as it was away from the busy B1102, and arrived in Burwell at a better and safer point. It was established that the owner of the railway track had not been approached yet.

Cllr Latchford noted that the B1102 was the most direct and used by cyclists currently. Cllr Greenfield noted that cyclists had no other cycle path to use.

Cllr Latchford stated that bringing a cycle route through the village would cause problems of congestion, could cause problems for access for those unable to use active travel and could result in vulnerable pedestrians mixing with cyclists. Some other councillors disagreed.

b) Dog waste bin for the playground. The Clerk reported that ECDC have said that dog waste can be put in normal bins and that for now, they will monitor for a problem with dog fouling. Therefore any dog fouling needs to be reported to the ECDC through the relevant page on their website.

Correspondence for consideration.

Email regarding the results of the Rogers Road speed monitoring.

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that the numbers of vehicles were roughly 15 an hour at peak times, compared to over 1000 an hour along the B1102 through the village. The direction chosen for the SID to face was because that was the direction the car came from involved in the collision. Given the lack of a significant speeding problem shown, the PC agreed that there was no justifiable reason for either putting the SID up facing the other way or investing in a permanent speed awareness fixture.

Repairing/replacing the speed awareness signs on Mill Hill

After discussion, it was agreed that the PC order two replacement signs with the speed and smiling/frowning face display.

Replacing playground equipment

The PC is looking into more grants and the Clerk to ask Wicksteeds to update their quote.

Report on Heating Scheme

A report was circulated and made available to the public prior to the meeting. 5 houses are connected and 2 more being worked on.

Cllr Covill noted that manhole covers were thawing/drying from some source of

heat; Cllr Greenfield to feed back to check insulation.

Cllr Kent-Phillips asked about the slow attachment rate. Cllr Greenfield stated that there was a significant level of bureaucracy involved but that it should get slicker.

Cllr Gynn noted considerable frustration from some people regarding the wait, e.g. ordering oil to keep heating going is tricky when it's unknown how long it will be required.

Parish Councillors' Reports

Cllr Gynn reported that the school had had an Ofsted inspection and has emailed the school to ask for a report for the PC in the New Year.

Cllr Latchford reported that the Allotment Inspection had taken place on 12th November. One plot needed attention and Cllr Latchford agreed to contact the allotment renter in the New Year to discuss a timetable for improvements.

Cllr Latchford noted that the lamppost at the bus stop (Swaffham Bulbeck end of the village) is still not working and is to get the lamp post number and pass on to Cllr Kent-Phillips for to follow up.

Cllr Greenfield reported that the 3-year contract with CGM for grass-cutting has now concluded and that he would like to negotiate a 12 month role-over of the contract to cover the coming time of financial uncertainty, to be put to the PC for approval. The PC agreed to this

Cllr Camps reported that the missing sign on Rogers Road had not been replaced. Cllr Kent-Phillips confirmed that it is on the low maintenance list so will be replaced when enough jobs have been reported in one area to make it efficient.

Open Question Time

A member of the public asked for the position of the B1102 speed signs and asked if the field between the Dyke and the heating scheme had some kind of special status. Cllr Hart noted that the cable from the solar farm could run along side the road if this was the case.

And from January...

Notes from the Swaffham Prior Parish Council meeting

Cllr Covill chaired the January meeting of the Swaffham Prior Parish Council, attended by 7 Parish Councillors and 3 members of the public.

Reports

East Cambridgeshire District Council – Cllr Charlotte Cane attended. A report was circulated prior to the meeting.

Cllr Cane noted that ECDC can again collect waste containing Persistent Organic Pollutants – mainly domestic upholstered seating. They are still unable to dispose of them but have found space to store them for the time being.

Cllr Cane had been part of a scrutiny panel looking at the budget of the Combined Authorities and noted that funding for buses was only budgeting for 6 months, with the same amount again having to be found for the following 6 months and then more found again for the future. Cllr Cane stated that the aim should be to keep the current services for the next 2 years then look to improve them after that. The Combined Authorities had launched a consultation regarding bus services and Cllr Cane urged the PC to respond to it.

Cllr Cane noted that street cleaning had fallen behind due to the concentration on bin collection and asked that PCs look at which streets should be prioritised.

Cllr Covill noted many complaints about the numerous potholes on local roads. Cllr Cane said that it is an issue everywhere and that there are real budgetary pressures, but that CCC are looking at getting money from central government for repairs to the Fen roads and were attempting to fix new potholes as they appear to prevent them getting worse, but cannot keep up. Cllr Cane urged people to report potholes on the County website, so they are at least recorded and the extent of problems are known and confirmed that it would be worth the PC writing directly to CCC regarding the poor state of the roads locally.

Cllr Latchford asked where the costs of consultation fees, design costs etc for the Heating Scheme could be found? Cllr Cane agreed to find out.

Matters arising from previous minutes.

Cllr Latchford noted that the bus stop lamp post had been fixed.

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that the accessibility statement was now on the website and that the new speed awareness signs for the B1102 were on order.

Planning applications received:

22/01475/FUL Single storey rear extension. 32 Green Head Road, Swaffham Prior, CB25 0JT.

No objections or comments were made.

PC budget and precept for 2023-24

It was agreed that the 2023-24 precept remain the same at £14,500.00.

Prior Arts Group to make use of the Pound and Keep for an art exhibition on the weekends of 15th/16th July and 22nd/23rd July 2023.

It was noted that the Pound and Keep had no public liability insurance under the

PCs insurance so the Art Group would have to take this on. No rent would be charged. The clerk will carry out a risk assessment of the site nearer to the summer.

Allotment plots on the B1102 site.

Cllr Latchford to draw up a map of the current allotment plots and the proposed new plots for discussion at the next meeting.

Report on Heating Scheme

Via email, Cllr Greenfield noted that due to Christmas and New Year and homeowners' understandable reluctance to a mess in that period, combined with construction/building industry holidays, there was not a lot to update. A news update is due to be published soon.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk noted that the hedging around one of the speed awareness sign posts had been cut back and the buddleia removed from the playground wall.

An updated quote for the replacement play equipment had been received from Wicksteeds – the total cost was now £14,404.66, held until 31st March 2023.

The allotment report from November had been sent to all the allotment renters.

The Clerk reminded the PC that the inspection of the grave markers was scheduled to take place on Wednesday 18th January, starting at 10am.

Parish Councillors' Reports

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that the cemetery tap had been found leaking on Christmas Day and had been turned off at the mains - the clerk to check the tap over the weekend.

Cllr Hart noted that the footpath near the Heating Scheme was no longer blocked by fencing, but had not been reinstated. He had emailed Maggie Pratt, who confirmed that levelling the footpath was on the list to do.

Open Question Time

A member of the public suggested that someone from the recycling team be invited to the Annual Village meeting, to talk to parishioners about what can go in which bin.
