# Editorial

What an extraordinary month for the Crier. Two serious complaints and a

bombshell! Last month's Crier reported a number of concerns from readers (in PC Notes, Letters, Our Reporter) that the Heating Scheme was running a generator 24/7 and Our Reporter asked if David Greenfield could tell us just what it was running on, with humorous comments about Just Stop Oil boycotting Heath Road. We can now tell you (see p. 11) that the fuel is Hydrogenated Vegetable Oil, (HVO) a bio-fuel, and the generator is just used to power the offices. We highlighted the issue specifically to get clarification and many apologies if a misleading impression was thereby caused.

Next, one of the two competing fast fibre broadband companies has written to us complaining that despite having a "Broadband Champion" (what dat?) AND the ear of one of our Parish Councillors, our Broadband reporter was still woefully unaware that they are planning to build in Swaffham Prior next year - see their letter and our response (p. 6).

But then the Bombshell. We are to have no more PC Notes. Readers must go on the Web and read the Minutes if they want to know what the Parish Council has been doing. David Greenfield pointed out that last month there was a factual error and that the report is from unapproved minutes, and somehow or other this led to the decision that forthwith and immediately there should be no more reports to the Crier. So that error will remain uncorrected then! Extraordinary! Up to date PC Notes have been published in the Crier since its inception, the other village magazines have them too and in our opinion Jude's monthly concise and readable reports (the minutes are much lengthier) are crucial to the magazine's duty to inform - we have written to the PC and will be challenging

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this decision at the November 9 Meeting. We hope we have your support.

Meanwhile, has another error has occurred? This month's draft minutes now say something different - so maybe this was not the decision that was taken? All may become clear on the 9th. Wish us luck!

We were very sorry to hear that our ex County Councillor James Fitch has recently died (see Charlotte Cane, p26), he was a lovely person and will be much missed. Meanwhile, Hooray! The Red Lion has FINALLY reopened and a big welcome to John O'Grady (from Tipperary) and Svitlana Hordivkop (from Ukraine) the new incumbents — by all accounts, the pub is now doing a roaring trade and we hope to hear from them in next Caroline Matheson month's issue.

#### A TO B1102 Transport Group

I write on behalf of the A to B1102 Transport Group (representing the villages from Fordham to Quy including the Wilbrahams and Bottisham) to ask you to take part in our transport survey. The survey takes around 10 minutes to complete and you can find it online at <u>www.atob1102.org/travel-survey/</u>. Paper copies are also available in St Marys Church if you would prefer to complete the survey in paper form. You can also return completed surveys there.

The survey is being conducted to enable us to better understand the travel needs of our communities, to build an evidence base to inform future decisions - to understand where people need to get to and when. We will use this information to lobby the various authorities who make decisions which affect our transport system, to safeguard and improve our existing (and potential future) bus services, to maintain vehicle access along our key routes, to build attractive transport alternatives as we all look to find ways to reduce congestion and get us to our destinations in reasonable time.

We realise there have been lots of surveys and consultations of late, but with our MPs, Local Councillors, County Council, District Councils and the Cambridge & Peterborough Combined Authority engaged in our work and over 300 respondees already having completed the survey, this information will be a key lever to inform future funding decisions which will affect us all!

#### **Gigaclear DOES intend to build in Swaffham Prior**

I am writing as the Community Engagement Manager for Gigaclear.

I have been made aware by a resident of the community about an article in your magazine that states that Gigaclear "do not appear to be planning to include Swaffham Prior".

Having had a look at previous articles I can see that you have already confused us with County Broadband. Can I ask where this information has come from? I report to a Broadband Champion and a member of the Parish Council every 6 weeks or so about our progress so was shocked to see this statement.

I will be posting on Facebook to say that we **are** building to the area and our works are due to start in the New Year.

Please can someone respond to this email as to:

Where this information came from that we are not building

What will be done to put it right

As we are building commercially, this could damage our ability to build to the community, and there is no guarantee that County Broadband will either.

I would appreciate an answer on this so I can tailor my social media post accordingly.

Eds Response: We can only publish what information we receive. The full quote from last month is: "I mixed up two different fast fibre broadband suppliers: County Broadband (https://countybroadband.co.uk/) who are planning to offer a service starting here early next year; and Gigaclear who have already started work in Bottisham and parts of Swaffham Bulbeck but do not appear to be planning to include Swaffham Prior.". This is a fair reflection of what we have been told by Gigaclear and County Broadband as explained below.

We provided Gigaclear with free advertising space in our April edition and this was accompanied by a letter from David Greenfield drawing attention to your proposed service. We responded to the advertisement expressing a personal interest but we never heard back from Gigaclear and, talking to fellow villagers, we do not appear to be alone in not getting any reply. The Crier has also not received any further information from Gigaclear either directly or via a "Broadband Champion" or via the Parish Council. In his letter, David spoke of us seeing "work commencing in the May / June timeframe" and a mailer being sent to every property starting in March. To our knowledge, neither has happened. It does not seem unreasonable for us to have inferred from all this that you do not (or no longer) appear to be planning to include Swaffham Prior.

County Broadband first contacted us in June and we initially assumed that this was at last a follow-up to your April advertisement, hence the confusion noted above between Gigaclear and County Broadband. We registered an interest in response to this, County Broadband responded almost immediately and they were very helpful in supplying us with full information about their proposed service. On the basis of this, we signed up for their service along with, they tell us, over 20% of the rest of the village. At this point, this appeared to be the only available offer.

Your email above arrived just as we were about to go to press with this month's edition and we have delayed publication in order to publish it and this response. We would be very happy to publish further information from you and/or County Broadband in next month's edition to help inform the village of the relative pros of the two competing Broadband services including speeds, prices, timescales and add-on services.

# **From our Reporter**

As September ended and we moved into the short season of Party Conferences several new changes were made. The one of most concern to us is Climate Change.

For some reason Rishi decided to defer for a few years the targets on electric cars etc. At this point I decided to read *Not Zero* by Ross Clark, our local national roving reporter who lives in Reach. Always worth reading. This had been published earlier in 2023. It is inevitably interesting and what emerged were two extremely important facts.

First, we had nodded through Parliament in 2019 an amendment to a previous Climate Change Act of 2008 which now committed us to achieving Net Zero by 2050. There was no discussion how this was to be achieved or the costs. Just



nodded through. We are now legally committed to this and could be taken court by any pressure group if we fail, or do anything which may cause it to fail. We are the only country which guarantees to achieve Net Zero. Other countries add "if possible" etc. We have no such get out. We must repeal that law.

Secondly, Ross Clark points out that we are helping to reduce our carbon emissions by importing more and more. For example we only produce 61% of our steel. The rest comes from abroad. We are loading carbon emissions onto the countries which provide all the goods we cannot or are not producing, and thus enabling us to be better than them at reducing emissions. Paul Latchford made this point at two Parish Council meetings when all the early discussions about the Heating Scheme often focussed on the amount of emissions being saved. Where was the Heath Road plant made? To be realistic and really honest we should have a Consumption-Based Net Zero target.

So, simple. Repeal the legally binding commitment to achieve Net Zero; and make it a Consumption-Based Net Zero Target.

We all know Climate Change is happening, and probably faster, or more slowly, than people think. And the world is putting its shoulder to the wheel with thousands of projects and trillions of money being spent. Many helping enormously. But the only solution is to find *100% reliable* replacements for oil, gas and coal. WE ARE NOT THERE YET.

Many will disagree with the above. I do not expect anyone to read Ross Clark, no matter how interested they may be in Climate Change. But it would be useful if all MPs read it. And you can pick what interests you as there are chapters on home and heating (our village is mentioned), transport, aviation and shipping, agriculture, green jobs etc.

After last month some people have queried the £22 billion I said it would cost to repair the House of Commons. "You must be joking" they say. I do admit I did take the worst figure from those in last year's review. See below.

There are roughly three options. 1) Remove everyone out for between 12 and 20 years at the cost of  $\pounds$ 7 to  $\pounds$ 13 billion. 2) Have a "continued presence" in a "more

condensed space" for more than 26-43 years at a cost of  $\pounds 9.5$  to  $\pounds 18.5$  billion. This will involve moving the House of Lords out at some point. 3) Move no-one out for between 46 to 76 years at a cost of  $\pounds 11$  to  $\pounds 22$  billion. This assumes there is "no business" for 4 months each year. These costs do not include inflation. Take your pick. Would you guarantee the repair, or achieving Net Zero, by 2050?

Last month was an exciting time for Swaffham Prior. As many in the village now know our PC for some reason made the decision to stop the *Crier* from publishing Jude's excellent "Notes from the PC meetings". Nothing like this happened for a very long time. The last occurrence was in July 1914 when the Parish Magazine made the following announcement. felt compelled to close the Churches on weekdays after the services are over. The present arrangement will continue until the wave of sedition, privy conspiracy and rebellion promoted by certain wicked women has passed." Goodness me. We only need a body and it could become another episode of Midsomer Murders. We are not told what the wicked women were doing. Have our Editors been wicked in some way?

## Message from the Heating Swaffham Prior Team – October 2023

#### One year anniversary event success

Thank you to those who came to the Anniversary Event on 18 October, we had about 40 people turn up despite the wind and the rain! So a big thank you to all who took the time to come down and enjoy some teas and cake with the officers and contractors who have been working hard on the scheme. We really enjoyed meeting all of you and putting faces to names where we had until now only been in contact via email.

It was great to hear from existing customers who are on the heat network and to see them sharing their experiences with people who wanted to join the scheme. We had some useful feedback as well as also some challenging questions from some residents. Where we weren't able to address these in full on the night, we will be in touch shortly. If you were expecting to hear from us but you haven't yet, then we do apologise, please drop us a line to heatingswaffhamprior@cambridgeshire.gov.uk.

A matter which was raised on the night was the access issue there is for some properties around how to get the heat network pipe to the property. This only affects a handful of properties in the village and we will be working with these properties these householders to see if we can overcome the difficulties surrounding getting the heat network connection to their homes. We anticipate coming to a decision on this issue in the new year.

#### Energy Centre generating renewable heat

We were disappointed to see a suggestion in the last Crier that the Energy Centre might not be operating sustainably. We can assure you that our site is a renewable energy centre. Like most construction sites, there is an onsite generator that uses HVO fuel (Hydronated Vegetable Oil) which is being used to power the site offices and facilities.

Please note that whilst we are powering the Energy Centre from the grid at the moment, it is due to be connected to the solar farm next year - this will make it a very green, sustainable network.

We have no idea where these rumours come from and they are simply not true.

#### Speed and number of connections

At time of writing this article, 58 properties are fully connected and receiving heat. We have two remaining connections to complete which will take us to 60 private customers. We are also working with Sanctuary and their contractor CCS to arrange dates to connect four of their properties. This will take us to 64 fully connected customers with one more to do.

The next phase of connections will start in Spring 2024. If you are interested in in connecting to the hear network, scan this QR code to complete a form to express your interest or our email is below and we can send you the form.



#### Heat temperatures

We take regular readings of the heat temperatures leaving the Energy Centre and these are in the high 60s getting into the 70s and we are seeing these temperatures when they are reaching customers properties. We guarantee heat at above 62 degrees in the summer when water reaches the customers property at the Heat Interface Unit (HIU). Both heat temperature sensors in the HIU and at the Energy Centre are RHI accredited.

# Julie's recipes for November Sausage bake

1 tbsp sunflower oil 2lb coarse cut pork sausages 1lb leeks, thickly sliced 1 ½ lb potatoes cut into slices 3 oz red lentils Salt and pepper 2 bay leaves 2 cloves 1 garlic clove, crushed 1 ½ pints of chicken stock Chopped parsley to garnish

1. Heat the oil in a large pan and brown the sausages, lift out and cut into slices.

2. Layer the leeks, potatoes, sausages, and lentils into the casserole, adding seasoning, the bay leaves, cloves and garlic among the layers, finish with a layer of potato.

3. Pour in the stock, cover tightly and cook in a preheated oven at 160c for  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours, checking the liquid level occasionally.

4. Remove the lid, increase the temperature to 200c and cook for a further 30 mins until the potato is browned. Garnish with parsley and serve hot.

Serves 6

### Steamed Jam or Syrup pudding

4oz soft butter, plus extra for greasing
4oz caster sugar
3 tbsp jam or golden syrup
2 eggs beaten
6oz self raising flour
1 tsp baking powder
About 1 tbsp milk
2 pint pudding bowl

1. Lightly grease the pudding bowl, and spoon the jam or syrup into the bottom.

2.Cream the butter and sugar together, then add other ingredients and blend until smooth, adding enough milk to give a dropping consistency.

3. Spoon the mixture into the pudding bowl and smooth the top. Cover with greaseproof paper and tie with string.

4. Put the pudding into steamer. Cover and steam for  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  hours, topping up with water if needed. When ready turn out on a plate and serve with piping hot custard.

# **ELY FOOD BANK**

The Ely Food Bank is part of a network of more than 1,300 centres, run by the Trussell Trust. It was founded in 1997, started in Salisbury by the son in law of Betty Trussell, with her legacy, after he was approached by a woman who was struggling to feed her children and was worried about them going to bed hungry. He studied the data on poverty and deprivation in the UK and found significant numbers of people going hungry as a result of a sudden crisis.



The Food Bank model spread through church networks, inspiration drawn from a verse in St Matthew's Gospel: "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was in prison and you visited me."

The Trust's vision is a future without the need for Food Banks. Its aim to provide



a minimum of three days nutritious. balanced emergency food, to people: families, couples and singles, who have been referred to them and to support them in the crisis they face.

Between April 2022 and March

2023, close to 3,000,000 food parcels were distributed by the Trussell Trust network, a 37% increase on the same period 2021- 2022. The number of people using Food Banks for the first time between 2022 and 2023, was 760,000.

The Ely Food Bank has 8 distribution centres: Burwell, Soham, Ely, Cottenham, March, Waterbeach, Chatteris and Haddenham. Food is donated at a range of places: schools, churches, super markets and businesses, sorted by volunteers at a local warehouse and redistributed to these centres. Vouchers can be generated by teachers, health visitors, social workers, doctors and housing associations and exchanged for a food parcel at a food bank. Household goods, cat and dog food is also available.

A member of the CAB attends most sessions and can offer additional, invaluable support to clients: advice on debt, housing issues, mental health and benefits, help filling in forms and contact useful organisations.

# **Our Reporter's Entomophilia**

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

# The Swaffhams' WI

**INSPIRING WOMEN** On Monday 16<sup>th</sup> October W.I. members welcomed Helen Ackroyd to tell us a little about the history of Anglesey Abbey. The name 'Anglesey' possibly originated from the original name of a lost hamlet of Angerhale which stood somewhere in the

vicinity.

The original building was not an abbey but a priory belonging to the Augustinian canons built around 1135, in wood until they could afford to build in stone, where their purpose was to look after the local population. After the dissolution of the monasteries in 1536 the land was acquired by the Hynde family who used the stone to build Madingley Hall. Only one room remained of the priory which eventually became an entrance hall to the private house it became in the early 1600s.



Among the owners through the years have been Thomas Hobson, the Cambridge carrier, who bought it for his daughter and her family, when it was renamed Angelsey Abbey, and the Downing family.

It was finally bought in 1926 by Urban Huttlestone Broughton and his younger brother Henry as a bachelor country house to enjoy country pursuits such as horse racing at Newmarket and shooting parties with their friends. The brothers had inherited a fortune from their maternal American grandfather which enabled them to live a life of leisure and to alter the house to suit their lifestyle, making the old entrance hall into a dining room and moving the original entrance to the corner of the two buildings where it can be seen today.

In 1932 Henry married and moved out of the abbey leaving his brother, now the first Lord Fairhaven, having inherited the title which had been about to be bestowed on his father, also Urban Huttlestone Broughton when he died. Lord Fairhaven was an avid collector of books for which he built a library to accommodate all 9,000 of them; clocks, tapestries and paintings for which he added a two storey picture gallery. He also found time to design the gardens.

On his death in 1966 he left the house to the National Trust, stipulating in his will that nothing in the house and gardens was to be altered, it had to remain as a home in an English country house.

# Mothers' Union

At our September meeting, Wendy Bowen (wife of Revd Roger Bowen) gave us a talk on 'The Transformation of women's lives at the Jungle Doctor Hospital in Tanzania'

We began by looking at a modern map of Tanzania, highlighting Bunda in the north, where a girls' boarding school and safe house

are built and supported by funds raised by the Anglesey Group of Parishes.

One hundred and sixty years ago missionary work began in Tanzania. The famous physician, explorer and missionary David Livingston (1813-1873) being one of the first. East Africa was divided into British and German spheres of influence by the Anglo-German agreement of 1886. British East Africa (now Kenya) came under the formal control of the British government in 1895, while immediately to the south lay German East Africa (now Tanzania). Germany not wanting Zanzibar or Uganda negotiated with Britain to acquire Heligoland and Britain take over Uganda and Zanzibar.

Soon after this the Anglican Church Mission Society (CMS) prioritised for

conversion of Uganda. Not looking at the map realistically they thought the distance from Zanzibar to Uganda could be travelled by oxen and bullock carts. This turned out to be impossible due to the tsetse fly causing fatal harm to oxen. Arab slave traders from the middle east took a route from Dar es Salam, which the missionaries decided to use. Progress was very slow and their efforts ceased at Mpwapwa 108 km. from Dodoma (the current day capital of Tanzania).

We then looked at a 1930's map drawn in 1940, showing the railway from Dar es Salaam to Kigoma built by the Germans. Wendy drew our attention to the small town of Mvumi, 38 km from Dodoma. As the became evangelised area by the missionaries, a boarding school for girls and Jungle Hospital were built in Mvumi, and a small Cathedral in Dodoma. The hospital mainly dealing with maternity and gynaecology needs. In 1960 Wendy and Roger came to live in the small village of

Mvumi whilst at the Theological College. As a young girl Wendy had read many of the Jungle Doctor books written by Paul White: an Australian Christian Missionary who established the hospital in Mvumi. Little did Wendy know when reading the books that she would actually give birth to her youngest son at the Jungle Hospital in 1969.

Girls were subjected to many harms, including disease, forced into marriage by their uncles, slavery, death in childbirth. Females were highly valued with wealth being valued in cattle. The uncles (not the father) of a female being given a cow when she married. Today it is not allowed to be valued in cattle. Boarding school is the best way of protecting girls from being abducted whilst travelling to and from school.

Wendy re-told an experience she encountered in 1965 that she will never forget. Living in a very rural area, with mainly non-Christians living in the bush. One very dark African night 'Black as velvet', huge clouds, no stars or moon she woke to loud shouting and on looking out a young man was shouting "wake your husband and come to our home we need a hospital". She and Roger quickly responded and got in the car, and with the young man running ahead they made their way along very dark rural tracks. Eventually in the headlights they could see a very poor little house, with two figures standing outside. The headlights soon revealed a voung woman of 16 her face in utter shock and dressed in sacking. Behind was an older woman clutching something in her arms. It was soon revealed the woman was clutching twin babies. In non-Christian Africa when a woman gave birth to twins it was assumed the mother had been unfaithful, and her husband was not the father. Unless mothers were rescued, the babies and in many cases their mother were killed. Roger and Wendy took the young mother and her twins to a place of safety at the Mission Hospital. Unfortunately, Wendy never knew what happened to them after. Those first missionaries got their priorities right by providing safety for girls and women, which has resulted in saving the lives of thousands of African females.

In non-Christian Africa, when a woman gave birth to twins it was assumed the mother had been unfaithful and her husband was not the father. Unless mothers were rescued the babies and in many cases their mother were killed. Roger and Wendy took the young mother and her twins to a place of safety at the Mission Hospital.

Our branch meetings usually take place on the third Thursday afternoon of each month in Fassage Hall, Lode at 2.30pm. At our next meeting on Thursday16<sup>th</sup> November we will be looking at the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence, campaign which the Mothers' Union supports. You are most welcome to come and join us.

# From our District Councillors Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

We were saddened to hear that James Fitch had passed away. James was County Councillor and District Councillor for many years for the Bottisham ward villages. He loved these villages and worked with and for the residents. One of his longest campaigns was to get safe cycle routes, so he was delighted when the Lode to Quy cycle path opened and looked forward to seeing the path from Burwell to Exning open. He knocked on Charlotte's door the day she moved in to Reach to welcome her and her husband to the area and introduce himself as their local Councillor – they were



very impressed! They soon realised that he was regularly out and about talking with residents and helping to get things done. More recently, he has given us advice and support and shared his long knowledge of the area with us. Like many people, we shall miss James greatly.

Everyone should have received their black bin bags by the end of October. If you haven't received yours, please let one of us know, and we will make sure they are delivered.

After years of refusing to answer questions about the finances and management of its trading companies, and a demand this February for an extra £500,000 in fees for the year to 31 March, the Council has finally admitted significant problems with ECSS and initiated major reforms. The Chief Executive, who is also the Managing Director of ECSS, published a report triggered by a review instigated by the Audit Committee, following a proposal from Charlotte. There had been a clear indication of one of the major weaknesses when the Council's Observer at ECSS Board meetings, Cllr J Huffer, was asked how frequently she received and reviewed Management Accounts for ECSS and she admitted that "ECSS Board last reviewed the management accounts on 31 January 2023. Prior to this, as it is essentially on operational budget, the Board did not receive management accounts, instead it discussed and approved the annual statutory accounts". Regular review of Management Accounts is a key control of an organisation's finances. The Audit Committee will be reviewing the report in more detail and Charlotte will be pressing for a thorough and independent review of governance at ECSS and ECTC (which shares many of the same governance procedures as ECSS).

The Greater Cambridge Partnership has dropped its plans to charge people driving into and around Cambridge. We are working with colleagues to ensure that we get the much-needed public transport improvements for our area. This will require significant and sustained investment from central government, not just a one-off £2.3m. We were interested to see that the idea of a congestion charge in Cambridge goes back to 1990 when the Conservative County Council adopted 'demand management by road pricing'. This was firmed up by the Conservatives in 2009 with bids to Government for £500m funding to implement a congestion charge on very similar borders to the GCP's proposal, and deliver improvements to public transport, cycle paths etc. The Government funding stream was closed in 2010, and without the funding the County Council paused the scheme.

Our next 'Meet your Councillors' is on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> November 6.30-7.30 in Swaffham Prior Village Hall. Or you can join us in the Red Lion afterwards, as it should be re-opening in October. # News from Wicken Fen Nature Reserve

Earlier this year, the National Trust acquired an additional 15 acres (6.07 hectares) of arable land adjacent to the 24 Acres at Reach but separated from it by an Internal Drainage Board (IDB) ditch. The new land provides further opportunities for the National Trust to achieve their objectives of enhancing the habitats for the benefit of wildlife and providing access to nature for people.

One priority opportunity relates to Turtle Doves which historically used to be a regular summer presence locally. Unfortunately, British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) records show that the breeding farmland index list of birds have declined by more than 55% in the past 50 years, with loss of habitat a significant contributing factor. Turtle Dove, one of Britain's most iconic species, is now listed as globally threatened and is the UK's fastest declining species, with its breeding population falling by 99%.

Discussions with RSPB's Operation Turtle Dove (a national program set up to target habitat creation for the recovery of the species), identified the two plots of land as a suitable location to assist this species. To facilitate this recovery, the National Trust secured a Species Recovery grant from Natural England (NE).

The grant will fund the creation of four UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) Priority Habitats, allowing us to plant 635m of hedgerow, to establish wide arable field margins, lowland meadow and to create ponds. A wild bird crop will also be sown in the remaining arable area and a crossing point will be installed across the IDB ditch to join the two compartments via a permissive footpath from 24 Acres to Hightown Drove, providing an alternative green route between Burwell and Reach and offering greater access to nature for local communities.

We're excited to be able to share this news and will keep you updated on progress.
