Dear Editors,

Can anyone Remember Colin & Dorothy Henderson?

My name is Ivan Bertulesi and I am writing from Bergamo, Italy. I am writing to you seeking help in reconstructing a story very important to my family, which took place in Cambridgeshire, in the 1940s.

My grandfather, Oldoni Luigi, lived in Cambridge as a prisoner of war from 1943 to 1946, working at Dowcra's Farm in Shepreth. farm near your town. During those years, he became a close friend of Mr. Colin Henderson, so that, after the war, he hosted him in Italy for a few weeks.

Sadly, both my grandfather and Mr. Henderson are no longer with us, but all my grandfather's children (including my mother) have precious memories of their friendship and of the Henderson family's visit here in Italy when they were children.

For a long time, my mother tried to trace the Hendersons' descendants and address, to get in touch, but unsuccessfully. The letters with the addresses have been lost, as have the names of any descendant.

In this days, with the help of some journals and local history researcher, i managed to trace him living since the 70's in Swaffham prior.

According to my sources, Colin (and his wife Dorothy) seem to have had a keen interest in history and local events and wrote regularly to the local newspapers and was still alive in 1993. It appears he must have died after 2007.

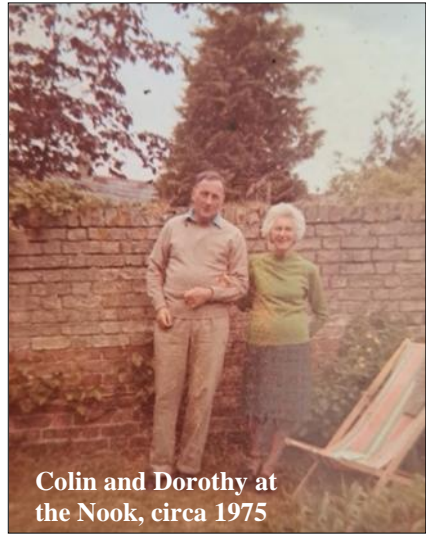
I was wondering if your journal was the one Colin used to write to, and if someone in Swaffham Prior could still remember him.

It would be truly important for my family to find information about your fellow citizen, so I'm turning to you for help with this unusual search. If you have any information in your archives, or if you can direct us to someone who does, we would be infinitely grateful.

From our Reporter at the Parish Council Meeting

There was a sort of holiday atmosphere at the meeting, nice evening, relatively simple agenda, no anticipation of anything contentious to slow things up, and it was all duly rattled through for an early finish.

Charlotte Cane kicked off with her report as ECDC councillor, mainly boring budgets but including the inevitable extra funds required for the Mepal Crematorium. The level of fees for the future use of this facility had been



discussed; at this rate they will need to be so high that no-one will want to use it. Meanwhile we were warned that our bin day will change, but don't panic, it won't be until June by which time we will all have received our new herd of bins (I wonder what happens to the old ones).

Discussion then moved on to sources of funds for those having particular trouble with energy prices (just don't mention heating oil). I lost track of the surprising number of different funds available, including a CCC scheme of means tested benefits up to £400, Winter Fuel, our local parochial charity and possibly others. Steve K-P offered to provide a list to be included in the next Crier (*This would be very welcome. Eds*), and it would be useful to have it on the village noticeboard.. Another useful contact is Pam Waters.

Then our local PC's finances, expenditure generally approved including an extra £208 + Vat for Junior defibrillator pads (see last month's report) and an increase of 3% for grass-cutting; David Greenfield (in absentia) was donated the short straw to renegotiate the contract. The Treasurer noted that he needs to start work on the annual accounts which will need an 'intermediary audit' because the turnover exceeds £25k. He has my sympathy – I used to have to do the same for a local Charity. A request for a donation of £750 by the Ely Foodbank was politely but firmly declined.

Someone has put some logs across an entry to Black Drove, either to discourage or to protect Travellers established there. In either case it's not helpful, firstly because the drove is a Byway for which access is legally required, and secondly because it obstructs efforts to control the space. The PC is not happy with ECDC's level of assistance in this matter.

Reports from the Clerk and individual councillors included the policy of laying down any wobbly gravestones, concern about the state of ground under the slide in the play area, and how the extensive piece of land housing the heating scheme's boreholes might be put to practical use, if only as meadowland accessible to the village. Requests to establish locations and prepare signage for 'The Close Pass' campaign (encouraging motorists to allow 1.5 metres when passing cyclists) received short shrift.

There is a legal requirement to hold an Annual Village Assembly, the responsibility for which has gallantly been assumed by the PC, and will be held in the Village Hall on the 20th May. The village bellringers were encouraged to take their turn on the stage, and two of the regular ringing band who happened to be at the meeting agreed. Look forward to it.

Next month's PC meeting will be the AGM, so will start 15 minutes earlier than usual to give them enough time to go through the motions...

Swaffham Prior Bell Ringers – May 2026

On a rare night off from Tuesday practice in the bell tower, the ringers gathered at Kate's house to learn more about handbell ringing. Under Lesley's very patient guidance we progressed from the more familiar Christmas tunes to some method ringing. This involved operating one bell in each hand – extraordinary co-ordination required!

This year the Swaffham Bulbeck tower has been marking the 205th anniversary of the bells being installed and rung there (16th November 1820 – 5 years before the first steam train had run), and also the 25th anniversary of the bells being rehung for the Millennium, with the addition of two bells bringing the total to 8.

As part of the celebrations, one of the young ringers who learnt to ring at Swaffham Bulbeck has composed a new method (tune) to be named Swaffham Bulbeck Delight Major. This is a very complicated method to ring and experts will be called in to help ring a quarter peal in the next month or so. Congratulations to Brin Wilkes for this amazing achievement.

Update: a Quarter Peal of Swaffham Bulbeck Delight Major was rung for the first time ever on Sunday 26 April 2026. The method will now go forward for official classification from the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers. Congratulations to all who took part.

Not to be outdone, Brin's mother Clare has designed a fantastic 3 metre tapestry seat cushion to run along one side of the ringing chamber (see over and below). The design incorporates the method of Swaffham Bulbeck Delight. Many of the ringers from both Bulbeck and Prior are each going to complete their own sections of the tapestry and we look forward to seeing the progress.

Julie's Bank Holiday Barbeque Recipes

Pimm's Glazed Chicken with Strawberry and Cucumber Salad

8 free range chicken thighs
2 tbsp Pimm's
1 tbsp soy sauce
1 garlic clove, crushed
2 tsp grated fresh ginger
1 tsp brown sugar
1 tsp white miso paste

For the Pimm's Glaze

100ml Pimm's
2 tbsp orange marmalade
2 tbsp brown sugar
1 tbsp cider
1 tsp miso paste

For the Salad

300g strawberries, sliced
1 cucumber, diced
2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
1 tbsp Pimm's
2tsp each of lemon, lime and orange juice
1 tsp sugar

1. Put the chicken in a bowl with all the top ingredients and then cover and marinate in the fridge for 2-4 hours.
2. Put all the ingredients for the glaze in a pan and heat to dissolve the sugar, then bring to a boil until thickened and syrupy. Set aside to cool.
3. Heat the barbeque. Take the chicken out of the fridge. Place on the BBQ and grill with the lid down for 20-25 minutes, turning and basting with the glaze regularly until golden brown and sticky and thoroughly cooked through. Set the chicken aside to rest while you make the salad.
4. For the salad, combine all the ingredients in a large bowl, Serve the chicken drizzled with extra glaze with the salad on the side.

POEM OF THE MONTH

The Patriot Robert Browning

An Old Story

I

It was roses, roses, all the way,
With myrtle mixed in my path like mad:
The house-roofs seemed to heave and sway,
The church-spires flamed, such flags they had,
A year ago on this very day.

II

The air broke into a mist with bells,
The old walls rocked with the crowd and cries.
Had I said, 'Good folk, mere noise repels –
But give me your sun from yonder skies!'
They had answered, 'And afterward, what
else?'

III

Alack, it was I who leaped at the sun
To give it my loving friends to keep!
Nought man could do, have I left undone:
And you see my harvest, what I reap
This very day, now a year is run.

IV

There's nobody on the house-tops now –
Just a palsied few at the windows set;
For the best of the sight is, all allow,
At the Shambles' Gate – or, better yet,
By the very scaffold's foot, I trow.

V

I go in the rain, and, more than needs,
A rope cuts both my wrists behind;
And I think, by the feel, my forehead bleeds,
For they fling, whoever has a mind,
Stones at me for my year's misdeeds.

VI

Thus I entered, and thus I go!
In triumphs, people have dropped down dead.
'Paid by the world, what dost thou owe
Me?' – God might question; now instead,
'Tis God shall repay: I am safer so.

Robert Browning's poetry is not as familiar these days as it deserves to be. He is a surprisingly modern High Victorian. His psychological insight, exploration of moral ambiguity and irony and the brilliance of his dramatic monologues retain their power and relevance in the 21st century.

The Patriot, imagined perhaps in the aftermath of the French Revolution, or, more probably, the contemporaneous Risorgimento in Italy, is a universal metaphor for the fickleness of the mob – nowadays more often referred to as the electorate – and the perfidy and treachery of demagogues – nowadays often called politicians. If you like, it can even be read as a kind of secular Easter story.

It came to mind as I listened to Sir Olly Robbins testifying before the House Foreign Affairs Select Committee.

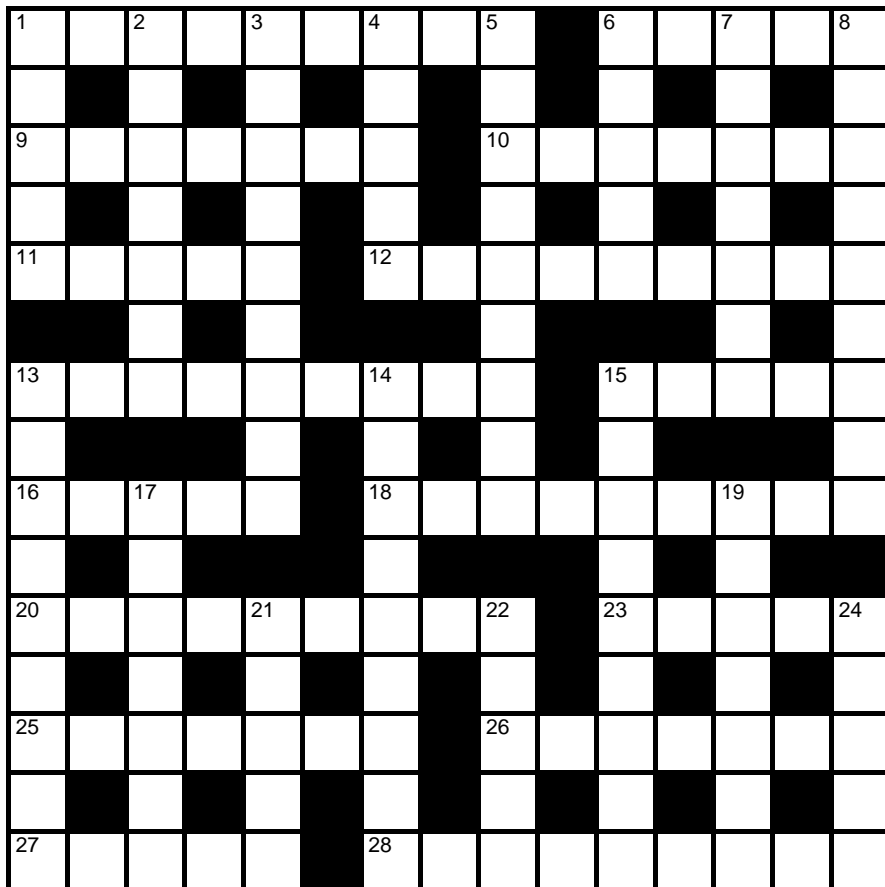

'My life didn't please me, so I created my life'. Is this quote from Coco Chanel something to be admired or something to send a little shiver of fear through your spine? The April meeting of The Swaffham's WI brought the wonderful Carol Poole to talk to us about Coco Chanel.

Gabrielle (Coco) Chanelle was born into a poor house in Saumur, France in 1883. Gabrielle's first 18 years were dominated by poverty, unhappiness, frustration and distress at her family being torn apart. Her father was an itinerant leaving her mother to bring up the 5 children in abject poverty. When Gabrielle was 11, her mother died and her father returned home.

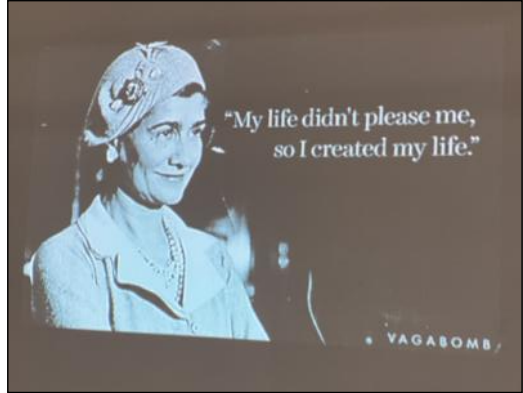
Her two young brothers as farm labourers and the three sisters were sent to a convent as orphans. Whilst growing up with the nuns as a child, Gabrielle acquired her dress making skills. In her twenties, she learnt tailoring and from then on continued to develop her own style. Connections with the wealthy and the aristocracy helped Coco step into the world of fashion.

Gabrielle's rise to fame and fortune as the creator of the leading French Fashion House is a complex story full of determination, sex, connections with the rich and famous and a refusal to let anyone or anything get in her way. Although there are many, many parts of Coco's life which are shocking, sad and simply upsetting, her sheer determination to move away from her terrible childhood, surely has to be admired? Her early life did not please her and she therefore created a fantastic career and life for herself. But at what cost?

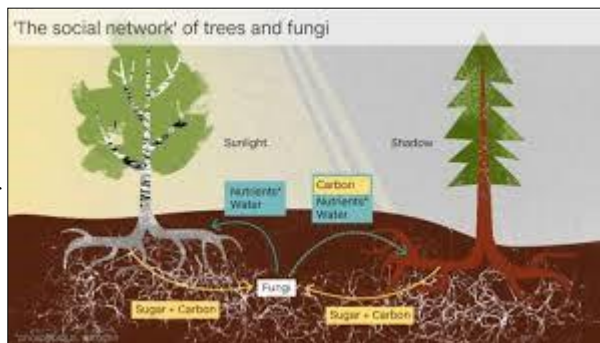


VILLAGE GARDENERS

At the April meeting of the Village Gardeners, Jim Paine gave a fascinating insight into 'The Empire Beneath Our Feet'. Jim is an environmental scientist with a background in conservation, and for 25 years he ran a plant nursery in Attleborough, Norfolk. He took us on a scientific journey to understand why soil is so important,

both to us and to the life forms that live within it. Soil is a complex, biologically active medium forming the uppermost layer of the Earth's crust. More than 95% of our food is grown in soil and at least two-thirds of all species live in it. Most soil dwellers are microscopic organisms such as bacteria and fungi and, although invisible to us, they are essential to plant life.

A teaspoon of soil can contain up to 10 billion bacteria and 750 metres of fungal threads! In the rhizosphere, the area of soil surrounding a plant's roots, roots send out signals to attract good bacteria, feeding them with sugars in return for nutrient cycling, help with water uptake, protection against harmful pathogens, and eventual decomposition. Beneath a forest floor, a social network of tree roots and fungi connects distant trees and plants. Termed the 'Wood Wide Web', a symbiotic relationship between the trees and fungi enables mature or thriving trees to share nutrients and water with seedlings or struggling trees and, in return, the fungi receive sugar and carbon from the trees.



Moving up towards the earth surface we find familiar invertebrates such as earthworms, woodlice and millipedes aerating the soil and breaking down organic matter, as well as mammals such as moles which aid with soil mixing and drainage. Soil from molehills is apparently nutrient rich and, although unsightly, can be used elsewhere in the garden. To sustain so much life, soil must be healthy and nutritious with a good physical structure. All soils, and particularly our local, chalky soil, can be improved by the addition of organic matter such as homemade compost or well-rotted horse manure. These days we are advised that minimal soil disturbance is better, so don't dig and instead add organic matter as a mulch on the soil surface and allow worms and other creatures to incorporate it. This helps to retain soil structure, moisture and warmth, and to minimise weed growth.

The next meeting of the Village Gardeners will be held in Swaffham Prior Village Hall on Tuesday 19th May at 8pm (doors 7:45pm), when Liz Wright will give us a talk about her experiences as a smallholder and market gardener; 'How Good Is The Good Life?' The talk will last about an hour, and tea, coffee and homemade cakes will be available afterwards. Everyone is welcome to join us; attendance is free for members (£20 for the year) or £4 for visitors. We hope to see you there.

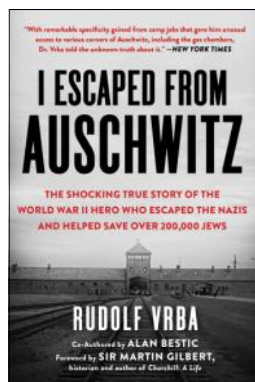

The Reading Group Reads... "I Escaped from Auschwitz"

by Rudolph Vrba

On April 7, 1944, two Slovak prisoners Rudolf Vrba and Alfred Wetzler successfully escaped from two Slovak prisoners from one of the most heavily-guarded and notorious concentration camps of Nazi Germany and finally succeeded in alerting Western authorities, such as Pope Pius XII, Winston Churchill, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, to the reality of Nazi annihilation camps, thus saving the lives of 200,000 Hungarians.

Strangely, this is one of my favourite books and it was I who foisted it on my fellow book-readers. This is because, against this unimaginable background of Hell where prisoners never hoped to survive, but rather "survive a little bit longer" there nevertheless blossomed immense courage, humanity, humour, tittle-tattle, incongruities of all sorts, and even (very occasionally) cracks in the facades of their stony-faced SS guards, of whom when Vrba was later requested to give instances of particular atrocities asked which bit of the water in the Danube would they like to talk about. There was the Kappa (notorious club-swinging prisoners in charge of others) 'Franz Marmalade', an enormously well-respected German political prisoner (even among the SS it would seem) who only pretended to club his charges when anyone was looking and although condemned to almost certain death for filching marmalade for some starving women by successive increasingly awful punishments, somehow these were not carried out quite right, and Franz survived the war to become an Austrian Inn-keeper. Then there was Vrba himself, who was obliged to smuggle love-tokens his Kappo and his girlfriend in Canada (section of the camp dealing with merchandise, often of great value, extracted from the continuously incoming transports before they were gassed). "Well, what a strange collection of clothes. A chicken! Swiss Milk Chocolate. Eau de Cologne ... and Chanel! I wish I could get that for my wife.." murmurs Scharfuhrer Wiglep, then "WHO GAVE IT TO YOU?" before delivering 47 blows, which should have killed him, but for once Auschwitz Hospital acted as a hospital and with the help of Kappo Bruno, Hermione and the Camps underground resistance, Vrba not only goes on to survive but seemingly collects the protective admiration of Wiglep himself. And eventually escape. A page turner of a book.

THE VIEW FROM LOWER END



Easter and April have been and gone and during it we received the most extraordinary threat of war. Possibly the last time was when France, UK and Israel in 1956 “concocted a barmy and deceitful plan with Israel” to rescue the Suez Canal from Nasser. The current BBC programme illustrates this. That earlier war was going to be a disaster until President Eisenhower smacked the

bottoms of Anthony Eden and his friends and told them to grow up. The current war has words like “full of hate”, “stupid”, – many more could be added, and will be. But before that another scandal came to light. And this concerned “Ladies”.

Earlier in the year I was surprised to discover that until the 1900s it was generally considered that female bodies were too complicated for science because of the hormonal variability of women. As a result, and perhaps unsurprisingly, the earliest research was largely conducted by men on male subjects and male animals with the assumption that the results would be the same for both sexes. There may have been some doubts studying women’s bodies in clinical trials because females are born with every egg they will ever produce. So there were some fears about research which might compromise the females’ fertility. As the 21st century moved on the range of medical research on women increased, and males also benefitted. But it has taken many years since the 1900s for women to have the same rights as men.

The WI at the beginning of this year, women and their rights and independence were attacked from its own ranks. This has left many branches of the WI absolutely seething with rage, Currently the WI in the UK has 6300 branches and 220,000 members. It was founded in 1915 by Colonel Richard Stapleton-Cotton and his dog Tinker These were the only male members of this all-female organisation. (For the full story look up Wikipedia). But it is now over a year since the Supreme Court decision on single sex And now Six Months since the Equity and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) confirmed the decision. It just needs Bridget Phillipson (Minister for Women) to present this to Parliament, and she has delayed and continues to delay, with The complexity of the law and all the procedures, political jiggery pokery, crookedness, as amply illustrated by the current Starmer/Mandelson affair. I think this can be safely left inn the hands of the WI remembers and taken out of the hands of Phillipson.

While all this was going on I was lent a book concerned with George Orwell’s 1984 which had been a recent Book Club choice. And a second opinion was sought. It is not an easy read especially the lengthy parts discussing, accepting, rejecting the World of Big Brother. More readable were the sex parts from the woman’s point of view, and experience. This was very interesting and essential for a man to read. The book was part of a Toppings Bookshop event, in Ely, and one of its Booksigning and Discussion Meetings. I would be interested to know what some of the discussion and questions were. If the book had been written by a man I am not sure some parts would have been published.

What ever the questions there is doubt that Julia by Sandra Newman will always be part of any discussion of 1984.

Operational Services committee 23 March 2026

Not an exciting meeting, as the agenda contained a number of housekeeping reports: the ECSS business plan for next year, the Community Safety Partnership six-monthly report, End of Year Reports on Service Delivery and the Plans for next year, Quarter 3 2024/25 Budget Monitoring Report (which predicts an underspend of £229,000 on operating costs and an overspend of some £3.7m on capital mainly for buying black bins and for the Mepal Crematorium had been deferred from the preceding year.

The proposed Mepal Crematorium rules and regulations were presented, discussed, and accepted.

From Our MP

Keep Ely and East Cambridgeshire Moving

Many residents have contacted me recently about the rising cost of everyday life – particularly the price of getting around and heating their homes. From filling up the car to travelling to work or keeping warm, pressures are building fast for families and businesses across Ely and East Cambridgeshire. That’s why I’m calling for urgent action to help keep our area moving.



I’m pressing the Chancellor for an immediate 10p cut in fuel duty, which would reduce prices at the pump by around 12p per litre. In a largely rural area like ours, where many people depend on their cars, this would make a real and immediate difference. Alongside this, I’m backing a wider package of measures to reduce transport costs, including cutting bus fares to £1, reducing rail fares by 10%, and lowering the cost of electric vehicle charging by cutting VAT and tackling unfair network charges.

I’m calling for these measures to be introduced for an initial three⁽⁰⁶⁾ month period, with the option to extend them if high prices persist. People need help now, not later.

I also continue to campaign for fairer support for off-grid households. Over a quarter of homes locally rely on heating oil or LPG rather than mains gas, leaving them especially exposed to volatile global prices. I’m therefore calling for an immediate three⁽⁰⁶⁾ month VAT holiday on heating oil and LPG, and for the introduction of a proper price cap, similar to the one that already exists for gas, to protect rural households from extreme price spikes.

In the short term, I want residents to be aware that a £53 million Government support package for vulnerable households reliant on heating oil or LPG is now available. Applications opened on 1 April, and eligible households may be able to receive up to £400 in support. (More information here: <https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/council/communities/support-with-the-cost-of-living/crisis-payment>). The fund is limited, so I would urge anyone who may qualify to apply as soon as possible. I encourage those not eligible but in need of support to seek advice from Citizens Advice.

I know that for so many, this relief won't be enough, or it will be too little, too late. After the Council's funding allocation, I wrote to the Chancellor to urge her to reconsider the funding formula in light of skyrocketing prices, and offer more support for all. I will continue pressing the Government to go further and act decisively to support households across Ely and East Cambridgeshire during this challenging time.

Swaffham Prior Heat Network – May 2026 Update

Here is the latest update on the Swaffham Prior Heat Network:

Connections and the Energy Centre

We are pleased to share that the Heat Network now has 111 customers connected. The team continues to monitor the network and the Energy Centre regularly, and the system is operating well. Works at the Energy Centre have also been completed, including the fencing and landscaping works. Photos of the Energy Centre are included below.

January – March 2026 heating bills

Heat bills for the period January -March 2026 have now been issued to customers.

We kindly ask customers to pay their charges within the stated payment period to avoid any late payment charges. If you have any questions about your bill, need clarification on the charges, or require support with payment, please contact the Heat Network team using the details below.

We are here to help and would encourage customers to get in touch early if they need any support.



Heating charges for 2026

We also want to reassure customers that, for the rest of this year, heating charges remain fixed, as set out in the 2026 Tariff Letter.

Prices will be reviewed again at the end of the year. As explained in the Heat Supply Agreement, the tariff is gradually transitioning from being linked to oil prices towards a blended approach that also reflects electricity costs.

We understand that global energy prices can change due to wider geopolitical events and market conditions. When we review future pricing, we will take a balanced and responsible approach, considering costs, fairness, and the long-term sustainability of the network while continuing to support the community as far as possible.

Heat Trust to Ofgem transition

The Swaffham Prior Heat Network is currently registered with Heat Trust, which provides customer protection standards for heat network customers.

As part of wider national changes, heat networks will move under Ofgem regulation from January 2027. This means that reporting and regulatory

oversight will transition to Ofgem as the new statutory regulator for heat networks.

We will continue to keep customers updated as this transition progresses and as any new requirements are introduced.

Customer Feedback:

We've been pleased to hear positive feedback from properties already connected, particularly about the quality of heat supply and the prompt response from the team when issues arise.

Vaccinations!

We are administering Covid booster vaccinations from the middle of April. Eligible patients are

Those aged 75 and over

Care home residents

Those 6 months and older who are immunosuppressed

We are also keen to vaccinate those 80 and over against RSV. RSV stands for respiratory syncytial virus. Classically it causes bronchiolitis in babies but can also lead to a nasty pneumonia in older people.

Frailty scoring

Please don't be alarmed if you see we've scored you as moderately or severely frail in your records. We are being encouraged to do this to reduce your risk of falls as target blood pressure and blood sugar readings are different if you're a little more frail than you used to be. Also we need every patient's weight and height measurements. Over the course of the year we will be messaging everyone for this information. Please feel free to come and use our measuring equipment in our pod in reception ahead of us asking you. Reception can then add this to your records.

ABTRACE: we are starting to use a new recall system. The text messages will ask for your date of birth to confirm who you are and will then allow you to book any recall appointment you need eg diabetes review. You may be asked to complete a questionnaire ahead of your appointments eg asthma or heart failure reviews.

Weight loss injections: We have had many enquiries regarding these. NHS funding criteria is very strict and currently we only have 8 patients who are eligible all of whom have been contacted. As more patients are eligible as the criteria changes we will contact you. If you are purchasing these injections privately please note it is important to use reliable contraception as their risks in pregnancy are unknown. The contraceptive pill may have its absorption affected by these injections and thus not be reliable. If you're on HRT, patches and gels are recommended as the tablet formulation may have its absorption affected

Appointments: For the first quarter of this year we had 185 appointments logged as DNA, (Did Not Attend) which equated to just under 60hrs of lost clinical time. We appreciate that circumstances and situations can change at short notice but ask, if you are unable to attend your appointment please let us know so we can reallocate this to another patient

Accessing the Practice: as you will be aware we have been operating a Triage system since 1 October, currently 11% of our patient are accessing us via the NHS App, 78% via our website and 11% are either attending or telephoning the Practice. By whatever means you contact us, please stay available to take calls swiftly when an appointment maybe booked, often within minutes of your request. If you have not heard from us within 4 hours your form may not have been received so please call us.

The surgery will be closed for training from 2pm on 15 May. Use 111 if

necessary.

Prescriptions: With 2 bank holidays in May please order by 15 May to collect on 22. Hopefully you will already have ordered by the 24 April for collection on 1 May.

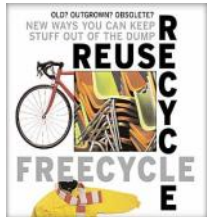

Notes from the Parish Council April Meeting

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday 9th April, chaired by Cllr John Covill and attended by 6 Parish Councillors and 2 members of the public.

Reports

East Cambridgeshire District Council – Cllr Charlotte Cane attended and gave a verbal report.

Operational services. The committee had been looking at next year's budget and the spending to date, noting an overspend on Mepal crematorium and on purchasing black bins.

The new black bins are due for delivery any time now, but are not for use before 1st June. Swaffham Prior's bin collection date will move to Wednesday in June.

Finance and Assets committee. The end of year reports on service delivery have been received. Funds have been set up for inclusive playground grants and for a County Council scheme giving grants of up to £400 to households dependent on oil or LPG heating and receiving means-tested benefits, for payment for oil or LPG. Cllr Cane noted that other schemes are available for households that do not qualify for this one.

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that the Parochial Charities also having heating grants available to residents of Reach and Swaffham Prior. Cllr Kent-Phillips also asked if a Local Infrastructure Grant would be considered for a bus shelter? Cllr Cane indicated it was worth looking into.

Cllr Covill asked for a contact to talk to about litter on Black Drove – Cllr Cane to look into.

Parish Councillors' Reports

Cllr Gynn reported that the surface at the foot of the slide in the playground is cracking. The clerk noted that the annual RoSPA playground inspection is due this month and Cllr Kent-Phillips volunteered to check in the meantime.

Cllr Hart asked what plans the Heating Scheme have for the borehole field – is it to return to agricultural use, turned into a community asset, left to go wild? The clerk will pass the question on to Cllr Greenfield for answer at the next meeting.

Cllr Kent-Phillips noted that he will be doing the year end accounts and the Annual Governance and Accountability Return and that the PC is due an intermediary audit as the expenditure was over £25,000.00.

Cllr Kent-Phillips also noted that the next PC meeting will start at 7pm, as it is the Annual Parish Council meeting and that the Annual Parish Meeting/Annual Village Assembly is due to take place on 20th May.

Clerk's Report

The letter of support for the Reach Lode Catchment Plan was written and sent.

The Local Government Reorganisation 2nd letter was approved and sent, and an acknowledgement of receipt had been received..

Cemetery safety tests – 8 stones are scheduled for testing. The clerk will post 3

months notice in the Crier, on Facebook and on the cemetery noticeboard as all 8 have no active/living contact details. The PC authorised the clerk and Cemetery Warden to lay down any category 3 markers that posed an imminent danger to the public.

Matters arising from previous minutes.

Cllr Kent-Phillips reported that the replacement defibrillator pads cost £208 including VAT.

Correspondence.

Charlotte Cane MP had emailed to raise awareness of a petition for funds for peat-affected road repairs.

The Cambridge County Council Active Travel Officer emailed to raise awareness of the Close Pass campaign, asking for drivers to leave a 1.5m gap when passing cyclists.

Cllr Jonny Edge (ECDC) emailed circulating the second joint letter of support for option A (Local Government Reorganisation).

East Cambs District Council emailed announcing that the new bins will be delivered between 30th March and 1st June 2026.

Grass-cutting contract.

Cllr Greenfield had emailed to confirm that the increase in the grass-cutting contract for 2026 would be 3%, as had been expected and used for budgetting.

Cllr Greenfield had also suggested the following changes to the grass cutting contract:

- 1) A monthly invoice for £913.75 + VAT for 8 months i.e. March - October,
- 2) The Parish Council has access to their online portal to inspect 'site visit details'
- 3) The PC reconcile the account after each of the June & October Invoices to establish any discrepancies and a credit note is raised, if necessary, in the month of July & November to correct the account before any further invoices are paid.

The PC agreed to all three changes and Cllr Greenfield was authorised to access the portal and manage the contract on the PC's behalf.

Close Pass campaign.

The PC agreed that placing of temporary signage for this campaign would be inappropriate in the village.

Grant application.

The PC rejected a grant application from Ely Food Bank as the scheme does not cover Swaffham Prior and is not exclusively for Swaffham Prior residents.
